
Membership fees for the 2020/2021 year have been set at \$150 The next step forward is for new members to pay for their membership at Regional Australia Bank with your name as a reference.

As new kids on the block, Bridgewater Angus were very happy with the result of their third on property bull sale on August 6th. They sold 38 bulls averaging \$6,250 and were well supported by local buyers.

Top price at the sale was \$10,000 for Var Discovery son P86, suitable for heifers and purchased by EC Graham & Co "Sunnyside" Armidale. Volume and repeat buyers were Brian and Chris Hillier "The Laurels" Ebor who purchased four bulls to a top of \$9,000 and Greg Tighe "Kelso" Guyra who purchased three high indexing Var Discovery sons to a top of \$8,000.

Principal Roger Flower said

he was looking forward to offering an exciting line-up in 2021 including sons of Clunes Crossing Dusty QMUM13, Rennylea NORL508 BaldRidge Compass, Lawsons Magnificent VLYM638 and Boooragul General NTVN5.

The stud also added to their operation with the purchase of the top priced bull at the Booroomooka Bull Sale last Friday. Booroomooka President NGMP22 will be a great asset to their herd and will be used in the October Ai programme with 60 of their stud cows.

Davidson Cameron and Co, Guyra, conducted the sale, with Luke Scicluna acting as auctioneer.

Bald Blair breaks records at annual sale

There were smiles all round when the Bald Blair Bull Sale wound up on August 4th with a new record-priced bull, a record average and a total clearance of the 63 bulls offered.

After it was necessary to withdraw Lot 3, considered one of the stars of the catalogue, the week before the sale, vendor Sam White decided to substitute with a bull he was going to retain in the stud and collect semen from.

This bull, Bald Blair Phoenix P97, was considered by Sam to be the best son he had bred of Rennylea L519 who is leaving some great progeny in the stud and he was hoping that this bull would carry on after his father.

But to keep faith with the strong enquiry he had received for the original Lot 3 bull Sam felt he had to put up another bull of similar quality and as it turns it proved to be something of a master stroke with Phoenix P97 setting a new record top price for the stud of \$24,000.

Not only was the price outstanding but the bull was bought by a relatively new stud breeder, Damien Gommers, Mandayen Angus in South Australia who will work with Agri-Gene genetics in Victoria to make semen commercially available in Australia and NZ.

Bald Blair will still be able to access the genetics of this bull who has excellent growth and carcase figures being in the top six percent for 400 day growth and carcase weight, top 10 percent for 200 day growth, top seven percent for intramuscular fat and positive for both rib and rump fat.

But not only was the top price a record but the stud achieved its best ever average of \$8,905 with strong demand across the board, many buyers looking for lower birthweight bulls to join heifers but strong demand also for carcase bulls.

Bald Blair have had a long-time relation-

ship with Rangers Valley Feedlot and Meat Company, selling steers from their commercial herd and receiving detailed feedback on carcase performance and the quality of the meat produced was evidenced in the steak sandwiches served at the sale which many attendees said were the best on the bull sale circuit.

Sam White said was very humbled by the support given to the sale, especially as so many repeat clients bought bulls with strong support from Queensland, including Paul and Wendy Pownall of Monto, who have bought bulls from Bald Blair for around four years.

They secured 12 bulls for an average just over \$11,000, and particularly like the carcase performance of Bald Blair bulls, as they market MSA graded steers from Brahman cross cows, and also for management, fertility and high growth are important.

Also important is the fact that Sam vaccinates for ticks, so the bulls can go straight into the Pownalls tick country. The other bulk buyer from Queensland were the Murray family from Roma, who are also repeat buyers and this year secured 4 bulls.

Sam was also very thankful for the strong local support on the day with bulls going to new and old clients in the New England and over on the coast as well as some further afield in NSW.

At the end of the sale Sam White said he was "humbled, blown away and relieved" that all the work of building the genetics of the stud herd and keeping it going in the drought and this result augers well for the future of the program.

Growing up in Guyra, Anthony Gaukroger attended the local school, played sport and participated in many social activities. He also started his working life here, firstly at the abattoirs and later at the Bowling Club. Despite having left the town 17 years ago, he likes to keep in touch and it was this desire to reconnect with his past that led him to set up Blast from Guyra Past on facebook.

Now living in Kempsey, he got the idea from a page that operated there and decided to try something similar for Guyra. Initially he expected that maybe 50 people would join and they could reminisce about old times. Five years later the group is still going strong, with membership now approaching 2000 - almost the same as the population.

While he doesn't expect thanks, he was both surprised and pleased to get a 'pat on the back' on a recent visit for the work he puts in to maintaining the page.

"It's not my page it is everyone's page and a place for people to share memories and reconnect," Anthony said.

"When people stop you in the street, you realise how much they appreciate the page and if


"People knock small country towns but when the chips are down they know there is no better place to be, and having grown up there I know how that helps to shape the rest of your life "

However, he also loves the fact that as the group has grown people are posting their own photos, which he encourages by having theme days like Flashback Friday and Sports Saturday. A recent flashback calling for wedding photos was really popular and in his own words 'really went off'.

"It was great to see so many wedding photos and to see people commenting and sharing these happy memories," he said.

"This is what it is all about and I hope it continues for a long time and I am glad to have played a part in making this happen."

Operation Stock Check to combat livestock theft

The NSW Police Force Rural Crime Prevention Team has launched Operation Stock Check, an ongoing, proactive operation to prevent livestock theft by disrupting the movement of stolen stock in western NSW.

Operation Stock Check is a high-visibility strategy which will allow officers of all ranks to inspect vehicles carrying livestock to identify and target loads which may have been stolen.

Livestock theft has a significant impact on farmers across Central North, New England, Oxley, Central West, Chifley, Orana Mid Western and Barrier Police Districts, with a total of 368 incidents recorded in the past two years alone.

These figures include the theft of approximately

20,300 sheep and 1800 cattle, representing a reported value of more than \$4.3 million.

NSW Police Commissioner Mick Fuller, who attended the launch event at Armidale last week, said the NSW Police Force takes livestock theft extremely seriously due to the devasting impact it can have on farmers.

"This operation is one of a number of steps the NSW Police Force is taking to ensure we do what we can to protect the livelihoods of our farmers, who have enough to deal with without having to worry about criminals stealing their stock," Commissioner Fuller said.

"Police will now be stopping any vehicle carrying livestock in order to confirm the origin of the stock being moved.

"Officers will also be interacting with farmers and engaging with members of their rural communities to ensure they are protecting their stock in every way they can, as prevention is key."

Rural Crime Coordinator, Detective Inspector Cameron Whiteside, said Operation Stock Check is not targeting truck drivers, but criminals.

"All vehicles large and small will be stopped, and paperwork checked, to ensure the animals being moved are not stolen livestock," Det Insp Whiteside said.

"I want to remind all legitimate carriers, along with farmers that convey their stock in smaller vehicles and trailers, to have their paperwork in order so we can quickly identify those who are doing the wrong thing."

The Rural Crime Prevention Team was created by Commissioner Fuller in late 2017 to strengthen the NSW Police Force's focus on rural crime.

The team has since grown to 52 specialised officers dedicated to investigating rural crime, located at 26 non-metropolitan locations within NSW.

Information is treated in strict confidence. The public is reminded not to report crime via NSW Police social media pages.



Next week is a Stableford with Meg Simpson as the starter.



Last week saw a surprisingly low number of players compete in a 4 ball. The day turned out to be very pleasant for golf although the course was a little wet which showed in the low scores.


The winners with only 36 points were Herb Wilson and Wal Chapman. The runners up. Don Campbell and Phil Devlin, were only one behind on 35.
