Local agents have welcomed the announcement of \$5 million funding towards a significant redevelopment of stock selling centres in both Guyra and Armidale. Member for Northern Tablelands and Minister for Agriculture Adam Marshall made the announcement on Monday joined by Interim Administrator Viv May and Sam Sewell, President of the New England Associated Agents (NEAA)

Armidale Regional Council submitted the funding application in collaboration with the NEAA and President Sam Sewell said the upgrade will mean that they will have the ability to attract stock from a wider area and increase the throughput at both saleyards.

"Volume is the major reason people come and we want to see that we can provide facilities that people are comfortable to sell their livestock in," he said. "It will attract stock from a wider community and the throughput will be greater, the employment will be greater and it will be a win for everyone in that respect."

Discovering science in a fun way

On Monday October 20th, St Mary of the Angels had a visit from the UNE Discovery Voyager van. The students had the opportunity to engage in some fun and exciting science activities. They investigated the planets and their distances from the Earth and the Sun. The children pegged inflatable model planets into the ground along a tape measure and compared relative distances of objects by measuring different angles to the planets and base distances. Standard reference directions were determined with a clock and the Sun as the reference point.

The students also engaged in some creative chemistry activities. They made "Elephant Toothpaste" where yeast solution, hydrogen peroxide, soap and warm water were combined and created an exciting bubbling reaction. They also tested the pH levels of household substances such as lemon juice, lemonade, water, laundry soap and diluted bleach. The final activity was the "Whoosh Bottle Demonstration" where a small amount of ethanol was placed in a large bottle and shaken to produce a flammable vapour. When ignited by Kieran from UNE there was a bang and flames could be seen inside the bottle. The students had a great morning and really got involved in this fabulous learning experience.

It is estimated that Guyra and Armidale saleyards inject more than \$72 million into the local economy each year, selling around 300,000 head of sheep and cattle on average every 12 months.

The Guyra Saleyards will remain the focus for sheep sales in the region. The upgrade will include replacement of timber sheep yards with steel, reconstruction of loading races, relocation of cattle yards, refurbishment and expansion

to amenities and kiosk facilities, renew water supply and stock water troughs and improvements to internal and external access roads.

The Armidale Saleyards will continue to only manage cattle and includes replacement and extension of cattle holding yards, expansion of vehicle parking area, implementation of roof water harvesting and wash-down reuse, renewal of cattle weighing scales, refurbishment of amenities and offices and installation of solar

panels.

Member for Northern Tablelands Adam Marshall said that increasing the holding capacity and improving access will make these yards some of the highest quality in northern NSW, attracting the best stock, biggest buyers and highest prices for farmers.

He acknowledged Armidale Regional Council and the New England Associated Agents for the plan they presented to the government.

"This is just the type of big

picture infrastructure which both Armidale and Guyra needs to rebuild their drought, bushfire and COVID-19 effected economies," he said.

"By capitalising on both town's strengths in agriculture, these upgrades will ultimately result in new and greater opportunities to market livestock, facilitating the growing appetite for online selling.

Construction is expected to commence in the first quarter of 2021 with work completed by the mid 2022.

In Australia, the statistics paint a grim picture, with women being hit hardest by the pandemic:

- More women than men live below the poverty line
- · Almost one in ten Australian women in a relationship have experienced domestic violence during the coronavirus crisis, with two-thirds saying the attacks started or became worse during the pandemic
- Most people assisted by specialist homelessness agencies in 2018–19 were female (60%).

Can you spare a moment and a few basic items to light up a woman's life? Share the Dignity asks you to donate a handbag and some essential items to women and girls in need. "It's In The Bag" is a simple idea which works like this:

- Donate a handbag in a good, used condition that you no longer use
- Fill it with items that will make a difference to the daily life of a woman in need
- Be sure to include the essentials such as a sealed packet of pads and tampons, roll-on deodorant, toothbrush, toothpaste, shampoo, conditioner and soap
- Add little luxuries like lip balm, new socks, a magazine, anything that would make a woman or teenage girl feel special

Q Fever vaccination clinics return

The Guyra branch of the NSW Farmers Association and the Guyra Medical Centre are running another Q Fever vaccination Clinic. This is the third time they have teamed up to assist those most at risk from this disease which is prevalent in the area.

Q Fever disease is a significant cause of illness and indeed death in the broader community however people working with animals are especially at risk. Guyra is one of the hotspots in NSW for this illness with as much as 22 per cent of the population showing exposure to the disease. The disease can present as an acute flu like condition that is quite debilitating in itself, however some people contract a chronic form of it that can have a debilitating effect on the patient for months or even vears.

The bacteria that causes the disease is found in most farm

animals but is also present in cats, dogs and native animals such as kangaroos. The range of people at risk is growing, as we understand the extent of the disease. Green keepers and gardeners are at significant risk due to exposure from native animal dropping. Farmers, shearers, vets, vet nurses, abattoir workers and anyone handling the clothing of these workers are at an extreme risk of contracting Q fever.

The good news is that this disease can be prevented with a vaccination. The bad news is that each person has to be tested for possible exposure to the disease before you can be vaccinated.

Q Fever vaccination requires three visits to the doctors. The first visit is a blood test to ensure you haven't had the disease, the second is a skin test which also tests to see if you have had the disease and the third visit is for the vaccination if negative to the previous testing.

The skin test on the second visit is a vial which when made up is active for 6 hours and there is enough for 150 patients. The cost of this vial is \$45 so once activated it is best if as many people as possible use it. The Guyra Branch of NSW Farmers will sponsor the cost of this skin test as they feel it essential that as many people as possible be vaccinated to this debilitating disease.

If you are over 15 years of age and are at risk of contracting this illness you are encouraged to partake in this program. NSW Farmers will pay for the skin test regardless of whether you are a member or not. The patient will be required to pay \$150 (gst inc.) for the vaccination if it is deemed necessary, as it is not available on the Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme. This however

may be tax deductible (check with your accountant).

NSW Farmers is encouraging all people at risk of contracting this illness to take up this offer and get vaccinated. This is a special Q Fever Clinic being run by Guyra Medical Centre and NSW farmers Guyra branch. You do not have to be a patient of the Guyra Medical Centre or a NSW Farmers member to partake in this program

Essential work on local powerlines this weekend

This weekend Essential Energy crews will complete maintenance work on the main powerline which supplies Guyra town, Black Mountain, Longford, Baldersleigh and the surrounding areas.

Operations manager Ranges, Paul McWilliam, said the work would minimise the risk of equipment failure, and in turn unplanned power outages for customers, and help to ensure the electricity network remains safe and reliable for the community.

"During our proactive cyclical inspection programme 10 pole cross-arms and other network components were identified as nearing end of life or requiring maintenance," Paul said.

To enable Essential Energy crews to complete the works safely, a planned power outage has been scheduled for Sunday, November 1 between 8.30am and 3.30pm, and will affect all homes and businesses in Guyra town, Black Mountain, Longford, Baldersleigh and the surrounding areas. Affected customers will be notified in advance by Es-

sential Energy.

"Significant planning has been undertaken to complete the project as quickly and safely as possible, which includes bringing in additional crews and equipment from Armidale, Glen Innes and Inverell to work with our Guyra teams," Paul said.

"On this occasion, given the area and the number of customers affected, it has also been possible to schedule the works for a Sunday, to minimise any inconvenience on the wider community."

Essential Energy has developed operational protocols to ensure employee, contractor and community safety during the COVID-19 pandemic.

"We thank customers for their patience and understanding while we work to ensure a safe, secure and reliable electricity network for their community," Paul said.

The scheduled works are dependent on suitable weather conditions and may be postponed if the conditions are unfavourable or unforeseen circumstances arise.

Weekly Wool Sales

October 23rd - After 100 cent plus rises last week a pause in the market would have been quiet normal. Instead upon opening the market rocketed and the Eastern Market Indicator recorded its second largest daily rise on AWEX's records.

This was certainly enough to create a pause on the second day of sales as all Merino micron price guides gave up some ground. By the end of the week the market had closed at its highest level since April. Crossbred types were the standout this week and were firmly back in favour with the 26 and 28 micron indicators climbing 17% and 27%

respectively. 31,093 bales were sold nationally for the week with a passed in rate of 6%.

Major buyers included Techwool, Endeavour Wool and PJ Morris. The rise in the market has pushed next week's national offering just above 44,000 bales. In a strong sign that prices may have run too fast, too soon, the Fremantle market selling after the Eastern seaboard, witnessed declines on the final day at almost double those recorded in the Eastern states, with a large jump in the passed in rate. The forward market is now also pricing in a degree of uncertainty.

Police issue warning as scammers target locals

Police would like to warn residents of a scam that is currently occurring including in parts of New England Police District.

Increasing numbers of phone calls in the past weeks involve a scam where residents are receiving calls saying that they are wanted on warrants.

The scammers then ask for the person to provide identifying information.

The resident is then advised that they have 24 hours to pay the fines associated with the warrants by a wire transfer or they will be arrested.

Police wish to advise the community that Australian law enforcement will not call and request this information and will certainly not request you to pay by a wire transfer.

The scammers often 'spoof' phone numbers to mask where the calls are originating from.

Don't call numbers they give you or the caller ID on your phone — look up the phone number for the organisation they claim to be representing from an independent source such as their website.

Police urge residents to remain vigilant with your personal identifying information.

Your personal details are your identity, so please do not share them — protect them and protect yourself.

\$5m redevelopment of Armidale and Guyra **Livestock Selling Facilities**

The Armidale region is set to become a centre of excellence in the management and sale of livestock with this week's announcement of \$5 million funding towards the significant redevelopment of the Armidale and Guyra Livestock Selling Facilities.

Member for Northern Tablelands and Minister for Agriculture Adam Marshall made the announcement on Monday joined by Interim Administrator Viv May and president of the New England Associated Agents Sam Sewell.

Council submitted the funding application in collaboration with the New England Associated Agents which included significant safety, animal husbandry, water recycling and online sales improvements as a focus.

The Armidale Saleyards will continue to only manage cattle and includes replacement and extension of cattle holding yards, expansion of vehicle parking area, implementation of roof water harvesting and wash-down reuse, renewal of cattle weighing scales, refurbishment of amenities and offices and installation of solar panels.

The Guyra Saleyards will remain the focus for sheep sales in the region and includes replacement of timber sheep yards with steel, reconstruction of loading races, relocation of cattle yards, refurbishment and expansion to amenities and kiosk facilities, renew water supply and stock water troughs and improvements to internal and external access roads.

Interim Administrator Viv May said Monday's announcement was a huge win for the region and for the region's livestock producers who have been hit significantly by drought, bushfires and Covid-19.

"This big ticket infrastructure project will inject much needed jobs into the local economy and provide world class, best practice livestock management facilities ensuring our region's producers are given every opportunity to secure the best price at market and take advantage of growing online sales opportunities.

"The more people we can attract to the sales in our region the more the local economy will be boosted with the economic benefits flowing to our cafes, restaurants and retail environment.

"I would like to extend a big thankyou to Adam Marshall who was a big supporter of the project and helped to secure the funds through the State and Federal Government funded Bushfire Local Economic Recovery Fund

Construction is expected to commence in the first quarter of 2021 with work completed by the mid 2022.



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
