Council endorses application for Special Rate Variation

Armidale Regional Council last week endorsed a Special Rate Variation application to the Independent Pricing and Regulatory Tribunal (IPART) for the continuation of a temporary SRV to become a permanent SRV of 8.5% plus the 2.0% rate peg.

It follows community consultation on three options for consideration by the community on a proposed Special Rate Variation application IPART.

The three SRV options presented to the community included:

Option 1 - A permanent SRV of 18.5% plus 2.0% rate peg (total 20.5%) commencing in

Option 2- A permanent SRV of 8.5% plus 2.0% rate peg (total 10.5%) commencing in

Option 3 - Discontinuation of the temporary SRV of 10% (above the rate peg) applied by the former Armidale Dumaresq Council and ending on 30 June 2021

The report presented to Council for consideration at last week's meeting summarised community feedback during the six week consultation and indicated a commuconcerned about the difficult economic conditions ahead for the region and the impact an increase would have on residents' ability to make ends meet.

Mayor Ian Tiley said that even though he voted for the option to increase rates by 20.5% securing Council's financial position and improving services to the community he respected the decision of his colleagues.

"This has been a difficult decision to make for the elected body, particularly now as we rebuild economic confidence after the drought and pandemic have impacted our region heavily," said Mayor Tiley

"Sometimes in Local Government tough decisions have to be made and even though I believe we should be dealing with the issue now rather than for a new elected Council in September this decision means a reprieve for ratepayers with no changes to what they are currently paying."

Councillors also moved to

support a bill proposed by the Office of Local Government that will change the way Council can set rating structures and implement rates harmonisation.

The Exposure Draft Bill Local Government Amendment (Rating) Bill 2021 was released for public consultation on 22 December, 2020 by the NSW Government in an attempt to deliver a fairer and more flexible rating system for ratepayers and Councils. This will provide some relief to those set to be affected by the rates harmonisation that will be implemented from July 1 2021.

Since the amalgamation of Armidale Dumaresq Guyra Shire in 2016, Armidale Regional Council has operated under two different rating systems due to a four year rates freeze imposed by the NSW Government. This freeze will end on July 1 2021, meaning Armidale Regional Council will move to adopt one rating system for the whole Local Government Area (LGA).

If the bill is passed by parliament, it would mean the impending rates harmonisation could be stretched out over a four year period, significantly decreasing the impact on ratepayers.

Don't blame the golfers

I would like to reply to the letter written by Ann Williams in the Guyra Gazette January 20, 2021. The Mother of Ducks Lagoon was drained in late 1950 to accommodate the town common. It was for the locals to run their cows and horses, not for a golf course as she said and others have written. Golfers were not responsible for it to be drained, they had to fence in the sand greens.

I can remember the Lagoon in about 1951 being cover by 3 metre high bullrushes and weeds. From about 1952 to 1954 we had very wet years. After the lagoon was drained a concrete weir was built, left of the bridge going over the drain to keep plenty of water in the lagoon during wet time.

The levee bank was built as a government Centenary project around part of the lagoon, approved by National Parks and Wildlife. Where she got the notion that it was deep enough for fish and little boats to unfurl their sails is beyond me. It never happened before it was drained in my time.

If she had looked past her nose, she would see it is very flat, and not very deep, which caused it to become dry even before it was drained. Her assumption that the sinking of the bores drained the lagoon is strange. To my knowledge there were no bores when the lagoon dried up in the mid-1960s and early 1980s.

I have lived in the town a long time and am offended by the town being called Glug.

Miss Nina Youman was a school teacher at Guyra Central School for many years. Ms Youman worked with, and continued the work of Rev Norman McKie to establish the gardens and parks throughout the town. She was very knowledgeable in the field of horticulture. It was Nina's proposal that the hydrangea, which grows so well in the Guyra area, be adopted as the towns floral emblem. Another staunch supporter of horticulture in the Guyra District was Les Starr and he donated a trophy to the Guyra—Horticultural Society for a shop window display featuring Hydrangeas. Upon his sudden death, the trophy became known as the "Leslie T Starr Memorial" Hydrangea Window Display. From 1957, this trophy was hotly contested. The display was held over the Australia Day holiday. The first winner being New State Stores



2020 weather wrap up

In a complete turnaround from the previous 12 months, Guyra received above average rainfall in 2020.

The official recording for the year was 978 mm, 105 mm higher than the average. Rainfall was above average in January, February, March and December, with December being the wettest month recording 204 mm.

The wet December followed a drier than average November with just 15.0mm recorded. It was the driest November since 1936 when 14.2mm of rain was recorded.

The yearly total was a sharp turn-around from 2019, which was the driest ever recorded. The year's total of 302.0mm which was 576mm lower than average or just 34% of the average for the town.

Great time to visit a local wetland

Tuesday February 2nd was World Wetlands Day and the National Parks and Wildlife Service took the opportunity to urge people to explore local wetlands.

Recent rain mean wetlands in the area are looking better than they have in many years, and the birds, turtles and frogs have noticed. With Little Llangothlin and Mother of Ducks Lagoon nature reserves near Guyra and Gwydir Wetlands State Conservation Area near Moree there are plenty of local options.

NPWS Project Officer Joanne Ocock said these wetlands are currently teeming with life.

"We are so lucky to have these wetlands right on our doorstep in really accessible areas," Dr Ocock said. "The best way to experience them

is to be prepared and be patient.

"If you're in the Guyra area pack a picnic and head to Little Llangothlin or Mother of Ducks Lagoon for some gorgeous scenery without a long walk.

"Or take your binoculars and long lens camera and head to Waterbird Lagoon bird hide at Gwydir Wetlands State Conservation Area where keen birdwatchers have been rewarded recently with some spectacular finds.

"Species sighted at the hide this January include an Australian little bittern, blacknecked stork (jabiru) and pheasant coucal.

"Sightings of more common species such as pink-eared ducks, pelicans and whistling kites are almost guaranteed.

"Wetlands are important feeding and breeding areas for many native species of fauna as well as other migratory birds such as the Latham's snipe and sandpipers.

"Wetlands play a vital role in the ecosystem, improving water quality and recharging our ground water systems," Dr Ocock concluded.

Rural Market Reports

Local farmers urged to join feral fighters tilt against pest pigs

Local farmers are being urged to unite behind a new Herculean effort to contain the spread of feral pigs, by signing up for the Northern Tablelands Local Land Services Feral Fighters program.

Northern Tablelands MP and Minister for Agriculture Adam Marshall said Feral Fighters would provide landholders with the tools needed to help manage pest animals, particularly the scourge of feral pigs.

"Feral Fighters are local landholders who work together in groups to undertake co-ordinated pest animal control programs, on the ground and from the air," Mr Marshall said. "Between now and June, the program is facilitating a co-ordinated feral pig management program, with trapping, baiting and aerial culling to be undertaken in certain areas to supplement on-ground controls.

"Feral pigs pose a high risk of disease to livestock and cause significant environmental damage in the landscape. Group baiting and trapping strategically targets pest animal populations in a specific location and is an effective way to reduce the rate of re-invasion.

"The aim of the program is

the mass reduction of pest animals. By working together, a wider knockdown of the target species can be achieved. Working together is pivotal to the program's success and I encourage landholders to contact their local Biosecurity Officer so they can get on board this highly effective program."

By registering for Feral Fighters, Local Lands Services will provide free grain for feeding and poisoning to farmers, as well as loaning pig traps at no cost. Local Lands Services Biosecurity Officers will explain to farmers how to set up pig traps and provide free feed grain to get the best results.

Research conducted by feral pig expert Darren Marshall, from Southern Queensland Landscapes, has proven that the knockdown success rate increases the longer free feeding can occur and that 70 per cent of the feral pig population needs to be removed in order to have an impact.

Landholders must have a current chemical card to participate in the program. To participate, contact your local Biosecurity Officer on 02 6732 8800.

January 27th - There was a reduced penning of 2950 lambs, with sheep down to less than 100 head

The lamb offering comprised mainly young lambs. The quality of those lambs was good with a

large supply of light weights to suit restockers and a good supply of medium weight trad lambs. Heavy and extra heavy weights limited in number.

There was reduced processor competition, good restocker

support. There was little change in the market for restocker lambs. Once again the lighter weights sold strongly by comparison to the heavier weights.

Despite the reduced processor competition the market for

lambs to the trade held up reasonably well, aided by the lack of heavy and extra heavy weights. The market trend, slightly cheaper. Strong restocker demand for young Crossbred and Dorper ewes.

Weekly Wool Sales

January 29th - A more favourable exchange rate combined with an uptick in offshore interest sparked a large jump in the market this week.

Most micron indicators were up 100 cents on opening with the Northern region indicator finishing 96 cents higher by the close of the first day of sales.

Smaller gains were registered on the final day with the market finishing the week at a 10 month high. 37,542 bales were sold nationally for the week with a passed in rate of 5.8%.

Major buyers included Techwool, PJ Morris and Kathaytex. The Western region selling after the East coast had closed couldn't maintain the upward momentum recording 25-80 cent falls with the broader Merino types most affected.

This more often than not would indicate that prices could be under pressure next week, however forward market trades have continued to change hands at levels slightly above

this week's physical close as far out as November.

The rise in the market particularly for the finer types has resulted in a jump in the expected national offerings over the next few weeks with the total offering for the season to date almost on par with last season.
