Boost for Spring Festival



Member for New England Barnaby Joyce with Julie Waters, Wendy Mulligan, Liz Brown and Sharon Bowles from Guyra Garden Club on announcement of its \$50,000 grant from the Federal Government to establish a commemorative garden near Apex Park to honour local servicemen and women.

A memorial avenue of trees, which was first proposed by the then Guyra Shire Council in 1951, is now set to become a reality. The Garden Club has been successful in gaining a total of \$70,000 in grants towards the building of a memorial avenue and mandala

garden in Rotary and Apex Parks, adjacent to the railway line in Bradley St/Lagoon Rd.

Garden Club President Wendy Mulligan has welcomed the grant funding which is part of the Spring Flower Festival initiative.

"The first Grant from the

Fire Fight Australia Fund is for \$10,000 from the Foundation for Rural and Regional Renewal – Strengthening Rural Communities grant program, will be used to purchase of trees for the memorial avenue, the preparation of the land and then the planting of the trees,"

Wendy said.

"The second Grant is also for \$10,000, from the Department of Veterans' Affairs through the Saluting Their Service Commemorative Grants program, is for signage in relation to each tree.

The WHRS is on call for our community 24/7, 365 days a year. It costs approximately \$40 million per year to keep the helicopters and crews ready to respond when needed. “A QR code will be attached to each sign to give immediate information on the service person the tree relates to.”

“The third grant of \$50,000 from the Foundation for Rural and Regional Renewal – Tackling Tough Times Together program will be used for the design and construction of the mandala meditative garden and associated facilities.”

Federal Member for New England Barnaby Joyce said the latest round of funding aimed to strengthen the capabilities, connections and well-being of local communities like Guyra. He said the Guyra Spring Flower Festival 2021 - Memorial Avenue & Mandala

Garden will boost and strengthen the local economy.

“The Tackling Tough Times Together program has a range of benefits, including reducing social isolation, developing leadership skills, addressing disadvantage, reducing volunteer fatigue and stimulating the local economy,” Mr Joyce said.

Sharon Bowles from the Guyra Garden Club said that the support of local members the Hon. Barnaby Joyce MP, Federal Member for New England and the Hon. Adam Marshall MP, State Member for Northern Tablelands is greatly appreciated in both identifying available grants programs and in supporting the Club’s applications. So too is the support of

the Armidale Regional Council, by letter and by Council resolution to enable the use of the Park for this purpose.”

Treasurer, David Kanaley said that the completion of a memorial avenue and mandala meditative garden as part of a Guyra Spring Flower Festival will strengthen the resilience of the Guyra community.

The Garden Club expects the new festival to support the economic recovery of Guyra, especially its main street businesses from the recent drought and nearby fires, diversify the local economy by encouraging visitors and tourists to the town and build community pride and self-image.

Northern Schools Prime Lamb Competition

Winter's first cold snap expected this week

The first big cold blast of winter is about to hit, with forecast of heavy snowfalls which could see some areas of the NSW Northern Tablelands receive dumps of up to 20 centimetres, the biggest falls for several years. Guyra is expected to be one of the hardest hit areas with the extreme conditions expected.

The Bureau of Meteorology forecast is for an extended snow event from Wednesday through to Friday. On Wednesday June 9th, snow is expected down to 900 metres with an expected maximum of 5°C.

The snow will continue into Thursday with temperature expected to hover between -1°C. and 1°C. for most of the day with snow possible above 1000m, while Friday snow will also be possible above 1100m.

The last big fall of snow for the area was in 2015, when two consecutive snow events in July of that year. Snow fell on two consecutive days on the 12th and 13th of July set-

ting to a depth of around 8cm. Further falls were recorded on the 16th and 17th of July.

Another big fall occurred in October 2012 with settling to a depth of 10cm.

The forecast has triggered detailed warnings for live-stock producers in the region.

Northern Tablelands Local Land Services district vet, Lisa Martin, said the majority of stock would handle the cold snap well if producers take the usual precautions.

"They're the normal things like have plenty of feed for your stock... put out a bit of hay," she said.

But with producers still restocking and buying some animals from warmer climates, there will be some stock that need extra attention.

"Those animals will feel the cold a bit more than the locally bred stock," Ms Martin said. "They could be a little more pre-disposed to things like pneumonia."

There is now less than three months to go until Local Government elections in NSW.

Voters will head to the polls to vote for their council representatives on Saturday September 4th.

Ahead of the poll, Armidale Regional Council (ARC) Mayor Ian Tiley has given a strong indication that he will not be a candidate for ARC and will instead run for a spot on Clarence Valley Council (CVC).

It has been revealed that

his name was spotted on a Local Government Register of Candidates for CVC and he has been quoted in the Daily Telegraph as saying "the probability is that I will run" and that it is "time to return to paradise".

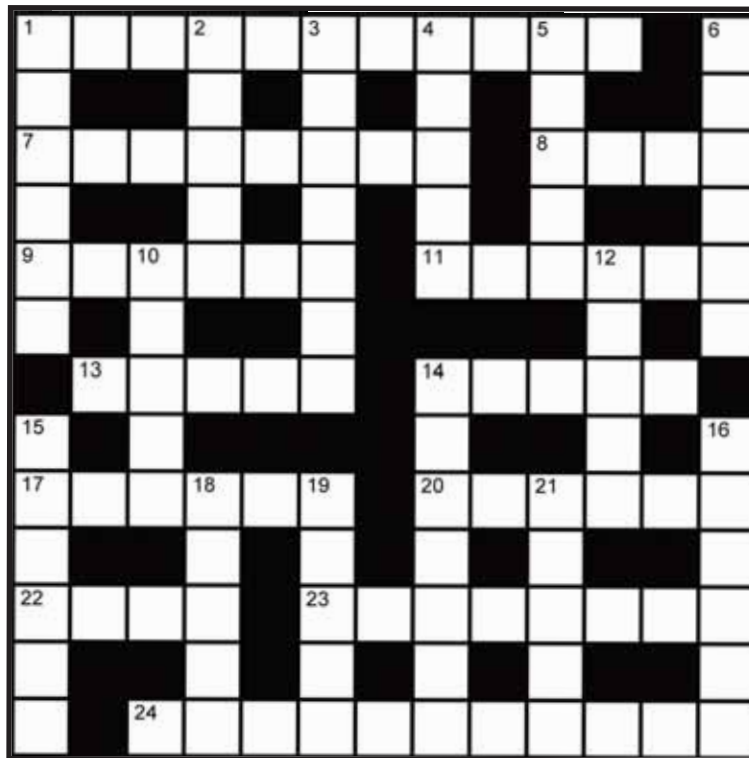
The registration of a candidate is a separate process to nomination and was brought in to help prospective candidates better understand the responsibilities of being a local government representative.

Mr Tiley was the first

Mayor of Clarence Valley Council when it was amalgamated in 2003 and has indicated that he eager to get back to his home in Maclean on a more permanent basis.

In 2016 Mr Tiley was appointed administrator of the newly formed ARC and was elected to its first council in 2017. Following political turmoil and the short-term appointment of another administrator to ARC in 2020, Mr Tiley was elected Mayor.

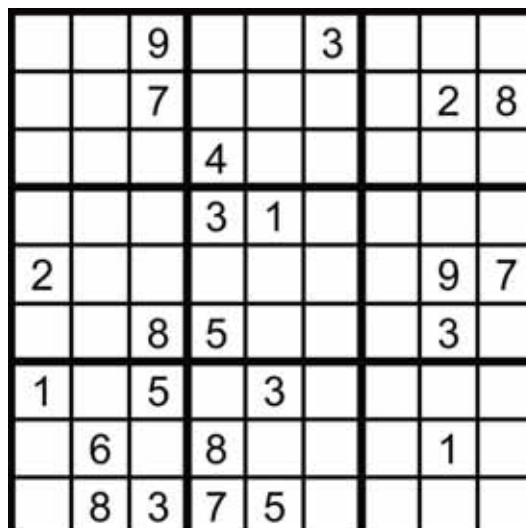

The Guyra Preschool and Long Day Care Centre welcomed Ms Nellie Blair on Thursday 3rd June to engage in Indigenous Learning.

The centre has been engaging in many different Indigenous experiences and engagement on an increased level this week to recognise

and learn about Reconciliation Week.

Nellie was the guest speaker for the week, Nellie read to children "How the birds got their colours" and assisted children to create their very own inclusion tree, where all the colourful birds were placed, simulating the essence

of the story.

Educators, children and Nellie all had a wonderful time during this experience, learning valuable life-long skills about helping, equality and consequence or benefits to ones actions.

Weekly Wool Sales

June 4th - The finer types kept powering along this week improving over both selling days. The rise in prices pushed both the Northern region and Eastern market indicators to their highest levels since March 2020.

A positive guide for next week was the Fremantle market (selling after the East coast had closed) moved even higher. The Crossbred and Carding sectors also showed a small but welcome hint of improvement. Some of the strength in the finer microns can be attributed to a drop in supply.

The latest AWTA testing data is showing a 10.5% decline in the volume of wool testing 18.5 micron and finer for the season to

date. The overall volume of wool tested for the season to date is showing an increase of 5.5%. These figures indicate a general broadening of the national woolclip. 35,724 bales were sold nationally for the week with a passed in rate of 7.4%.

Major buyers included Techwool, Tianyu and Fox & Lillie with support widespread. 221,000 extra bales have now been offered for the season to date as improving prices continue to draw held wool onto the market. Forward market focus is almost exclusively on the finer microns with 19 micron contracts keeping pace with the physical as far out as April next year.

Armidale Cattle Sale

June 3rd - There was a small reduction in numbers with vealers and yearlings well supplied and cows making up the bulk of the grown cattle. The quality and condition of the offering was mostly good. There was a notable absentee in the processor ranks, with a couple of extras filling the gap. Restockers and feedlots were also active.

Strong restocker demand resulted in dearer trends through the vealer steers, coupled with some quality related price change. Feedlots competed on the heavier weights while vealer heifers to restock saw a firm to dearer trend, with the few going to the trade substantially dearer. Medium weight yearling steers to restockers and

feeders sold to a dearer trend with demand increasing. Heavy weight feeder steers saw breed and quality related price change on a mostly firm market trend. Yearling heifers to feed sold to a slightly cheaper trend. In comparison, heavy weight heifers to the trade attracted strong competition to show a significantly dearer trend and an improvement in quality.

Heavy grown steers to process saw stronger competition and the market trend held firm to dearer as a result. Well finished grown heifers followed a similar trend. There was little change in the market for the better quality cows, however, lots at the top of the condition scores saw a cheaper trend. Heavy weight bulls also sold to a cheaper trend.



Gazette's Celebrity Footy Tipping



With only four games last week there should perhaps have been more full scores of 8 points, but only GG in the Locals and Celebrity Soley managed the top scores.

Most scored 6 points with a smattering of just 4.

Harry has reached 150 points to remain on top of the Celebrity Leaderboard. He is followed by Soley, Vu and Georgie on 136.

Cody is still in the race on 134, but the Gazette has done quite poorly over the last few weeks and is on 130 points.

There was hardly any movement on the Locals Leaderboard this week. The Red Devils and Nightwatchman only managed 4 points to allow The Red V to catch up and now shares the lead on 146.

The Star increased his lead over Nightwatchman (144-140) and next we have three on 134 and three on 132.
