

Winter rains have refilled the Mother of Ducks Lagoon, resulting in an influx of birdlife and providing added interest for visitors to the region. Guyra has received above average rainfall this year with 210mm falling since the beginning of June.

Run off over recent weeks has

replenished water levels in the lagoon to the highest they have been since 2011. It follows an extended period of low rainfall following the 2019 drought, which saw peat fires and extremely low water levels.

The Mother of Ducks Lagoon provides habitat for native wa-

terbirds and terrestrial birds, as well as frogs, reptiles and some mammals. Sixteen threatened bird species have been observed as well as many migratory birds listed under various international agreements.

Mat Makeham, Team Leader Ranger for NPWS New England, said that the rising water levels will bring in wider variety of birds. At this time of year, there will be quite a lot of swans and ducks getting ready to breed. There will also be an abundance of small waders out and about.

Mr Makeham said that the best place to view the birdlife is from the mowed section of the levee bank on the eastern side of the lagoon and the observation deck.

NPWS has a management plan for the lagoon, with the overall aim to return the lagoon's hydrology back to its natural state as far as practical given the modern urban environment.

Part of this management plan is to upgrade the existing pipes from the golf course dams through the levee wall which is where water would naturally sit for a long time.

Police urge compliance with health orders

Police are reminding regional communities of the importance of complying with all public health orders after a number of venues of concern were identified by NSW Health.

Two recent incidents have brought the impact of the current COVID situation close to home.

Just before 11am on Friday July 16, police stopped a Mitsubishi Lancer on the New England Highway, south of Guyra, and spoke to the driver, a 20-year-old man, and his male passenger. Inquiries revealed they men were from the Central Coast. They were each issued \$1,000 Penalty Infringement Notice's.

On Monday July 19, it was revealed that a person who later tested positive had visited Coffs Harbour. The area was put on high alert with people turning out in numbers to get tested. Officers will continue to have a high-visibility presence across NSW to help stop the spread of COVID-19 and keep the community safe.

Deputy Commissioner, Mick Willing, Regional NSW Field Operations, said it had never been more important for regional areas to abide by all restrictions.

"We have seen a number of venues in regional NSW visited by confirmed cases over the past week," said Deputy Commissioner Willing.

"The reason restrictions are in place in regional NSW is to protect those communities from a potential seeding event. We need your help to do this."

Officers from Traffic and Highway Patrol Command and the Police Transport Command will continue to patrol roadways and transport hubs across the state.

Your country needs you to get vaccinated

Last week Northern Tablelands MP Adam Marshall rolled has up his sleeve to receive his first jab of COVID-19 vaccine and has issued a challenge to the community – 'get vaccinated now or risk ongoing extensive lock-downs.'

"With the Delta-variant of COVID-19 spreading at an alarming rate, at this stage in the pandemic it's clear, if you are not already, your country needs you to get vaccinated now," Mr Marshall said.

"As far as I'm concerned the entire adult population of NSW, unless they have an underlying health condition, is now eligible for a jab and should be taking every possible step to get one.

"If you are aged 18 to 59 you can contact your doctor today and have a suitability assessment to receive the AstraZeneca or Pfizer vaccines, as soon as an appointment is available.

This is a message that is being reinforced by local GP Dr Jey at

the Guyra Medical Centre, who says that there is plenty of vaccine available in the local community and they just need people to roll up their sleeves.

Dr Jey said that they have already administered 670 first doses of AstraZeneca. 170 of those have returned for their second dose and he expects more to return as they come due. A further 250 people have received the Pfizer since it became available.

While he is pleased with the numbers, he believes there are

many people who could have the vaccine, but have been putting it off.

Dr Jey is now encouraging everyone who is eligible to come forward as the way out of the current restrictions and to provide protection if you do come into contact with someone who has COVID.

"We have plenty of vaccine available and want everyone who has been putting it off to get the vaccine as soon as they are eligible," he said. "We want to see everyone in the community vaccinated as soon as possible.

"As long as you meet the guidelines from the government, we are here to get the job done so we can get back to normal."

Having retired to BenLomond and, for the past three years, no-one has ever approached us with this proposal. Mr. Mills, where do you and your committee get the right to tell our community what YOU want for our village?

We don't come to Guyra and tell you what you need. You say "due diligence has been done and you have ticked all the boxes". Well you haven't ticked ours, and you say you are extremely grateful for the support of the community - which community?

There are good roads off the Highway from Black Mountain to Guyra; Guyra to Llangothlin;

Rural Market Reports

Weekly Wool Sales

July 16th - Whilst the market closed on a positive note last week the Northern region was not selling on the final day. It had some ground to catch up and this was evident from the commencement of sales.

All categories besides the Merino carding indicator finished the first day dearer with the Northern region indicator gaining 13 cents. The second day of sales was more about consolidation with only small changes being reported. The exception was the 28 micron indicator that gained 30 cents on consecutive days or a 13% rise for the week.

42,441 bales were sold nationally for the week with a passed in rate of 12.1%. Major buyers included Techwool, PJ Morris and Tianyu. Just over 100,000 bales have been offered for the first two weeks of the season this is 51% higher than the start of the previous season. Forward market prices remained bullish this week with 21 micron contracts changing hands 20 cents over the physical close for Spring maturity. Sales are now in the annual three week recess period. Heading into this with a solid last week of sales is always a positive and with parts of the world reopening from a prolonged slumber retail spending should start to tick over again. This report will resume on the 13th of August.



Demand high for face masks

Since than introduction of new regulations due to the threat posed by the Delta variant of COVID-10, one local seamstress has been extra busy. When the requirement to wear face masks was introduced two weeks ago Robin Godlonton ramped up production using her own design, which she has been making since last year.

Her design is for a closely fitted mask, preventing any gaps. She has masks suitable for men, ladies, teens, kids 7 to 12 years and kids 3 to 6 years. These face masks are made from two layers of prewashed cotton fabric plus two layers of iron on Vilene which is the protective part of the face mask. They also feature wire across the nose for a better fit to the face and have adjustable 3mm elastic around

the ears.

Robin's masks come in Navy, Black and Grey for Men, with a large variety of fabric colours and prints available for Ladies, Teens and kids. They sell for \$15 each, with postage and handling extra \$2.50 if needed.

Rainbow Room owner Jypsi Hooper said that demand for masks has been high and she has been opening extra hours to meet demand. Since the regulations came into effect she has sold 150 masks. She currently has four people, including Robin, making masks and they are definitely her biggest seller at the moment.

An added benefit is that it has brought new people into her shop, and they are often surprised to see that she has a wide range of stock suitable for all ages. Opening hours vary, so follow her on facebook for more details.

\$5,636 delivers new technology for museum

HUNDREDS of priceless historical items from Guyra's past will be better protected thanks to a \$5,636 State Government grant to purchase a new computer and remote close-circuittelevision (CCTV) equipment.

Since 2018, \$120,346 in NSW Government funding has been provided to upgrade the 113 year old original council chambers building on Bradley Street.

These works have included internal and external painting, installation of new flooring, side and back doors, display cases, security system, ultraviolet protection film on all windows, and hanging tracks.

The additional grant would allow Guyra and District Historical Society to maximise use of its CCTV system and provide digital history services to the community.

Member for Northern Tablelands Adam Marshall said that the Guyra Historical Museum is a wonderful treasure trove with many items held there of local, regional and even national importance.

"This year the society's volunteers completed the mammoth

museum renovation, including the addition of CCTV," Mr Marshall said.

"In order to maximise use of this technology a new monitor will be installed in the office and research room, along with an internet connection to allow remote viewing of the network when the alarm is triggered.

"This will remove the need for volunteers to attend the museum at night when the system is activated by movement. President of Guyra and District Historical Society Martha Weiderman said a new computer would make operating the museum more efficient.

"Currently all technology used to scan and print historical documents is provided at a cost by Guyra Adult Learning Association (GALA)," Ms Weiderman said.

"Having our own computer to scan, print or photocopy material on-site will save time and money.

"We also have two historical journals currently being researched and written. A new computer with internet connection will allow us to carry out research while on duty at the museum.

"I want to thank Adam and the State Government for supporting the upgrade of the museum, a building whose collection means so much to the local community."






