## Get vaccinated Guyra

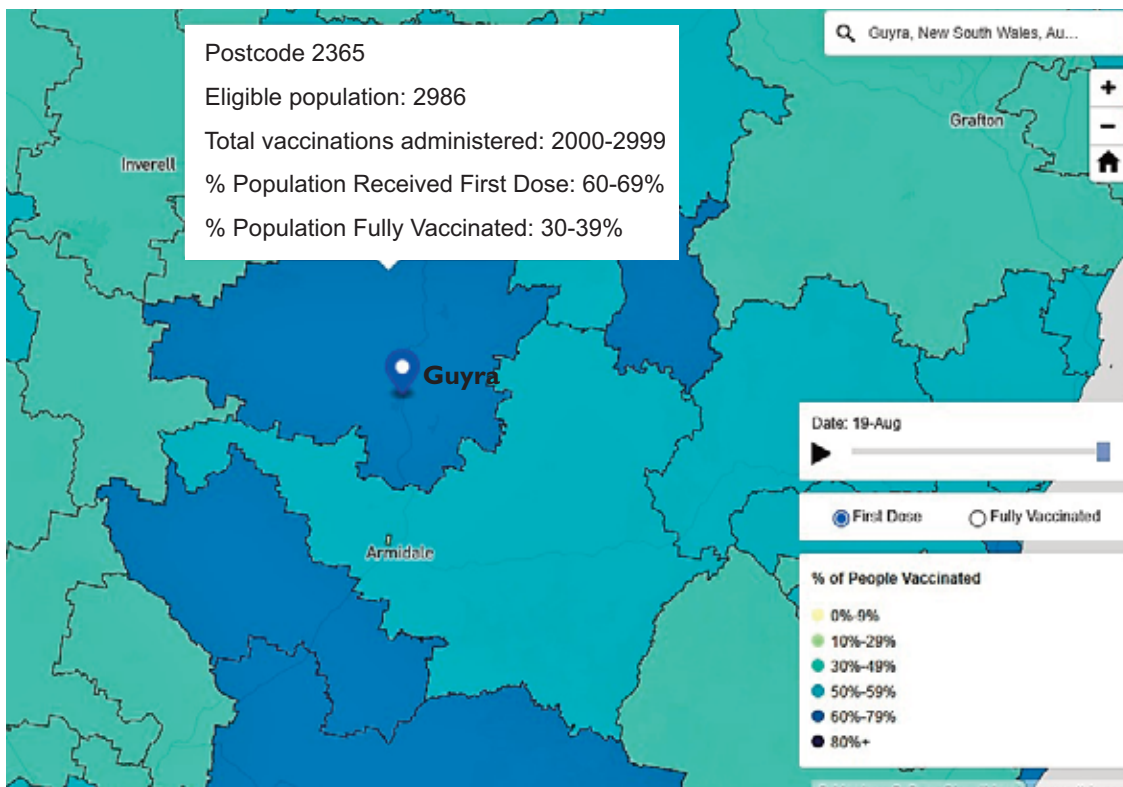
As Guyra enters its third week of lockdown there is some good news on the vaccination front. The number of first vaccinations for the 2365 postcode area is now well over 60% and for second vaccinations, the figure is nearing 40% of the eligible population.

In order to boost these rates further, the Guyra Medical Centre is stepping up their campaign to get the town vaccinated. Over recent weeks, they had had increased enquiry from people in neighbouring towns such as Glen Innes and Inverell seeking vaccination.

To ensure that Guyra residents remain at the top of the list they have set aside next week for unvaccinated locals between 16 and 59 to come forward and get their shot. This latest vaccination push is aimed specifically at Guyra residents.

The 16-59 age group is eligible for the Pfizer vaccination and the Medical Centre has a limited supply available.

Anyone in that age group who wants to book in will



need to phone 6738 4070 to book their appointment. The AstraZeneca vaccine is still available for those who are aged over 60.

This offer is open to all residents and they do not need to be a patient of the Guyra

Medical Centre. HSC students, school teachers and preschool educators are among those that they hope will come forward to get vaccinated.

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# NSW Government ignores local newspapers

Country Press NSW (CPNSW) and the Shooters, Fishers and Farmers (SFF) Party say that Regional New South Wales is missing out on vital health information due to the NSW Government excluding regional newspapers from their COVID-19 communications messaging.

They spoke out after the Deputy Premier, Minister for Regional NSW John Barilaro, recently announced on Twitter that regional NSW would go into lockdown. SFF said that for the NSW Government to fail to engage local, regional media to assist in communicating the lockdown is unforgivable.

Member for Barwon, Roy Butler said that rural and regional newspapers remain the most trusted media source for communities in our regions, and as such, they must be supported by Government and included in all marketing campaigns.

“It’s the same for consultation with regional NSW communities,” Mr Butler said. “Vital health information is not being communicated to our regions because Government has ceased to include small regional and rural newspapers in their marketing campaigns and would rather spend their money with Facebook to get their message out.

The Local Government (General) Amendment (COVID-19) Regulation 2020, which removes requirements for councils to publish advertisements and announcements in local newspapers, is already hurting small local papers and their communities. Now, these same publications are left out of State Government health campaigns.

“These measures impact a person’s right to access government information, and we see the reality of that in the misinformation spreading through our regions relating to COVID-

19 health orders and restrictions being relayed through social media,” Mr Butler said.

Country Press NSW (CPNSW) has described the NSW Government’s decision to announce the State-wide lockdown via social media as a slap in the face to those who live in the bush.

CPNSW President Lucie Peart said it was a “kick in the guts” to bush media who are normally the first point of contact for many communities, es-

pecially those with aged populations. Deputy Premier John Barilaro has defended announcing the lockdown on social media, saying it’s “very difficult” to get that information out via the media on the weekend.

This has been rebutted by CPNSW which represents 30 independent newspapers across regional NSW, including the Guyra Gazette.

The Deputy Premier, who has neglected previous requests for the NSW Government to work more collaboratively with rural newspapers, has tried to defend the Government’s decision, but Ms Peart said its actions were “indefensible”.

“We cannot understand why the New South Wales Government, unlike other states, will not promote its COVID messages through rural newspapers, which are the most trusted source and the major communication vehicle in their respective communities,” Ms Peart said

“Our member mastheads have websites and social media avenues alongside their print product to disseminate this information and where the State Government can advertise the lockdowns alongside crucial health advice,” Ms Peart said.

“It is contradictory for the Government to spend millions of dollars on social media, then have its members telling constituents not to take notice of the misinformation being spread by social media. This is what has been occurring.”

“Surely, it is reasonable for the Government to work with trusted rural newspapers which are a recognised and reliable source of local information,” Ms Peart concluded.

Ms Peart called on Mr Barilaro to take the lead and improve the way in which the NSW Government is communicating COVID-19 health and safety messages, including restrictions and support available, to the regional communities represented by CPNSW.

# Black Mountain family flee as fire takes hold

Part of Black Mountain's history has gone up in smoke with fire destroying a family home last week. The fire tore through the home on Toms Gully Rd on the night of Monday August 16th.

The Black Mountain Rural Fire Brigade were called to the scene at around 7.45pm to reports of a house on fire. When they arrived the house was well alight. They managed to save part of the home and were assisted by the Guyra Rural Fire Brigade and a team from Guyra Fire and Rescue Station 315.

It is believed that the fire started in the roof and may have begun as a chimney fire.. The home, estimated to be more than 100 years old, was constructed of pine which allowed the fire to take hold quickly.

A spokesperson for the Black Mountain RFS said that the crews put in a good effort to save what they could. They were assisted in their fight by using water from a well in the grounds, and managed to save the back part of the house from burning. Crews remained on the scene until around 10.45pm.

The house was occupied by the Peltonen family who man-

aged to escape before the fire took hold. A Go Fund Me page has been set up to help the family get back on their feet. To date \$2100 has been raised to assist the family. The page was said up by Kara Nelson who posted the following:

*"On Monday the 16th of August Tash and Trav and their 2 young children tragically lost their home and of their belongings in a house fire at Black Mountain, all 4 of them ran from the house with only the*

*clothes they had on there (sic) backs, to say the kids are devastated is an understatement. I am making this page to try and help them in what is al-*

*ready a very difficult time, anything you can donate whether it be money clothes or basic household goods would be very much appreciated."*

## 'Unsafe' tree to get the chop

Armidale Regional Council recently engaged the services of consulting arborists ArborViews from Newcastle to assess the condition and potential risk posed by an avenue of poplar trees on the New England Highway at Black Mountain.

Following the assessment undertaken on August 19th, initial advice received was that one of the trees poses an immediate risk to life and property and should be removed as soon as possible.

As a result, work to remove the tree will be undertaken

on Wednesday August 25th within the hours of 7am to 5pm (subject to weather conditions). Council will be working with Transport NSW to prepare a Traffic Management Plan to ensure the safety of motorists during removal works.

ArborViews will present a full report of their findings to be reviewed by Council Officers. The report will include advice on the future management of the trees, and if any additional work needs to be undertaken to ensure the safety of the public.

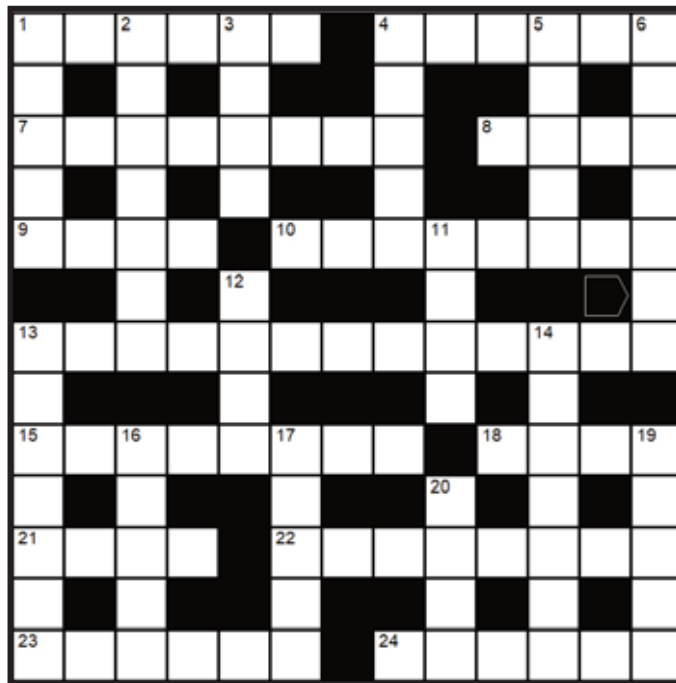

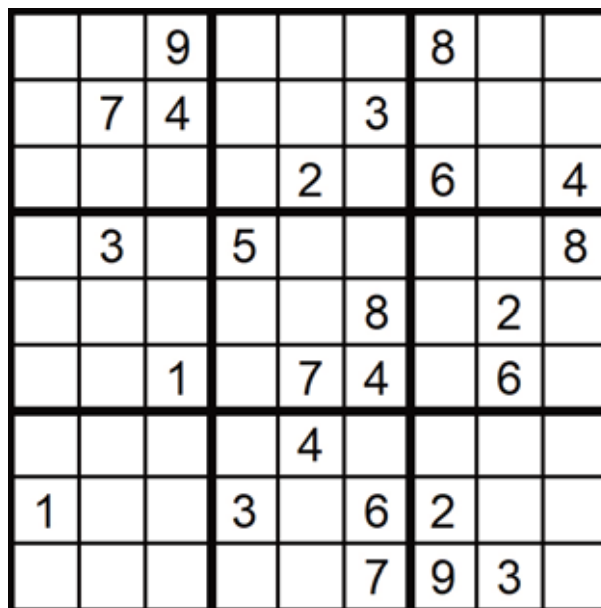

# Baits take bite out of wild dogs and foxes

The NSW Government has dropped 137,381 aerial baits assisted by an additional 9,000 ground baits laid by landowners, to reduce wild dog and fox populations in the State's north.

The recent two-week baiting blitz started near Niangala and continued to Legume, north of Tenterfield.

Minister for Agriculture and Member for Northern Tablelands Adam Marshall said it was a targeted campaign to maximise the impact on wild dog and fox populations across the region as they have the capacity to devastate livestock and native fauna, and carry diseases.

"Almost 150,000 baits were dropped along 3,434 kilometres of pre-determined aerial lines – a distance farther than Sydney to Perth.

"We know the significant impact these four-legged fiends can have on primary production, with wild dogs alone causing more than \$25 million in damages annually.

"The 2021 wild dog and fox

aerial baiting campaign was the culmination of five months of meticulous mapping and planning, and the injection of baits with 1080 by a team of Local Land Services (LLS) professionals, before they were deployed by helicopter.

"Once again, this was a successful collaboration between 409 private landholders, LLS, NSW National Parks & Wildlife Service and NSW Forestry Cor-

poration."

Mr Marshall said landholders and the NSW Government needed to maintain their control on wild dog and fox population numbers to minimise the burden on primary production and the environment.

"Research suggests we need to control 70 per cent of the wild dog population annually to prevent an explosion in numbers," Mr Marshall said.

Communities between Niangala and Legume are reminded to restrain domestic pets for another four weeks to minimise exposure to baits that may remain in the landscape.

## Rural Market Reports

### Guyra Sheep and Lamb Sale

**18-8-2021** - Numbers were greatly reduced in both sheep and lambs. There was a total yarding of 1400, down 1740 from the previous sale. There was a good quality penning of crossbred lambs and a fair to good quality offering of Merino's. There was reduced processor competition which was most noticeable in the heaviest weight lamb classes.

Market trends varied through the lambs. The good quality Merino lambs, all of which were purchased by restockers, sold to dearer trends. Well finished crossbred lambs upto 22kg cwt to the trade, sold on a firm to dearer trend with improvements of \$4 to \$5/head.

The reduced competition was a major contributor to the cheaper trends in the heavy weight classes with the heaviest

classes most affected. There were insufficient sheep to quote."

### Armidale Cattle Sale

**19-8-2021** - Numbers remained steady at Armidale this week. There was a good quality penning of young cattle, mainly vealers and the quality and condition of the grown cattle and cows was also very good. There was a small group of buyers in attendance, however participation levels were high.

Restocker demand was high through the light weight young cattle which saw vealers sell to a significantly dearer trend. The limited supply of yearling steers to restock and feed saw a firm to dearer trend, while the yearling heifers sold to cheaper trends.

Heavy grown steers over 500kg, including the milk tooth lines, sold to cheaper trends

with breed and extra weight contributing to the lower prices. Well finished grown heifers to processors also sold to cheaper trends. The quality of the cows contributed to higher prices in a dearer market where the best of the heavy weights improved by as much as 20c/kg. There was increased demand for bulls with all classes selling to dearer trends.

### Weekly Wool Market

**20-08-2021** - The size of this week's national offering shrunk on the back of last week's losses. 15% was withdrawn prior to sale leaving the offering at just 32,200 bales. The down-trend continued on the first day of sales however by the second day of sales a noticeable stabilisation of the market emerged. Some categories managed to close the day a few cents dearer

as did the headline Eastern Market Indicator. High passed in rates combined with the withdrawals prior to sale no doubt played their part in assisting the market to stabilise. 24,618 bales were sold nationally for the week with the passed in rate remaining high at 28.4%. Major buyers included Tianyu, PJ Morris and New England Wool. With the Western region not scheduled to sell next week the expected national offering remains similar to this week at 32,343 bales. The lower vegetable matter and higher strength types were least affected by this week's falls as an increasing amount of higher vegetable matter types come onto the market. Even with the unwelcome falls over the past fortnight the market is a far cry from the levels it dipped to just twelve months ago.

# OUR HISTORY - GUYRA GOLF CLUB



Opening of the Guyra Golf Club by Governor General Lord Stonehaven in 1928

The first report of a golf club at Guyra is reported the Australian Town and Country Journal 6th September 1911: Country Golf – A golf club has just been formed at Guyra in the New England district. The links be of a very sporting nature, and are near big “Mother of Ducks” lagoon. In the summer months there is no place in the State surpass the Guyra district; in the matter of climate, and as the hotel accommodation is excellent, the links are likely to induce strangers to visit the locality in the holiday seasons. Guyra is on the main northern line and the links will be about the highest in Australia, being over 4000ft above sea-level.

The next report is from the Golf Notes and Gossip 7th February 1912. The newly-formed Guyra Golf Club played its first match against Armidale. There were nine players on each side, and took place at Guyra. An exciting match resulted in a win for Guyra by 4 ½ matches 20

holes to 4 ½ matches to 19 holes. C.L MacKenzie of Sydney, led off for Guyra against J.W. Vigars and MacKenzie although short of practice played consistently and with a stroke round low down in the seventies had a very easy win and scored maximum points. Vigars is new arrival in Armidale, and is likely to prove an acquisition to their golf team, as he has played a lot of golf in the Old Country chiefly at Westward Ho where his handicap was 5. Other winners for Guyra W.P Craik 6 up on T.L Docker, A.A MacKenzie 6 up on E. Furness and A.W Everett 2 up on R. Somerset.

The Sydney Morning Herald 13th February 1912 reports that: The Guyra Ladies Golfers played their first golf match on their own course last week. Their opponents were a team from Ollera station.

At a Guyra Shire Council Meeting held on 12th September 1912 received a letter from the Secretary of the Guyra Golf

Club drawing attention to stone, the property of the Shire Council on the T.S.R with is on the links and interferes with play. The letter pointed out that the links were laid out on the site by the permission of the District Surveyor while claiming no legal right to be there. The club asked the Council to have the stone crushed and removed as soon as possible.

At a meeting held on 20th March 1913 it was moved by Dr, Harris, seconded by Mr. Craik that the old Guyra Golf Club be dissolved. Motion was carried.

Moved by Rev E.N McKie seconded by Mr. Stevenson that a new Golf Club be formed, to be called “The Guyra Golf”. Motion was carried.

The Golf Course being on traveling stock route it was not unusual to wait while a mob of sheep or cattle passed along the stock route. This also lead to the hazard of cow manure being on the course. A ruling formed 1931 states that ‘ a ball lodging in ma-

nure is a free penalty, and a ball falling into a post hole may be lifted and dropped without penalty’

Through the minutes and reports from 1925 onwards, there is re-iterated the inconvenience caused by the water from the lagoon encroaching on the course, flooding the fairways, and play having to be discontinued for many weeks during the wettest periods.

The Club house was built and officially opened on 20th June 1925.

The Annual report of 1936 states that ‘1936 has been a momentous year in the history of golf in Guyra, as on the 11th May of this year the Guyra Golf Club and Guyra Country Club (at “Urandangie” where the Gun Club is to-day) amalgamated under the name of “ Guyra Golf Club”
