Leadership, vision and humility were the standout qualities that resulted in Charlie Perry taking out the 2022 Australian Zanda McDonald Award last week. The Zanda McDonald Award supports talented and passionate young professionals in the ag sector from Australia and New Zealand.

Charlie, who lives and works on his family owned and operated wagyu beef farm at Guyra, returned to his passion for agriculture after a successful career in business consulting, and hasn't looked back. Since taking over management in 2016, he's overseen substantial growth in

Memorial Avenue tree planting completed

The planting of a memorial avenue as envisaged by a 1951 resolution of the former Guyra Shire Council was completed on Saturday 22 January. The memorial trees consists of 27 spring flowering species of advanced trees.

Malpas catchment group to design new 5 year plan

A small number of participants, including staff from Armidale Regional Council, attended the Malpas Catchment Group (MCG) meeting in December. The objective of the evening was to engage Malpas Catchment Group members, seek initial ideas and input towards the preparation of a five-year action plan (2022-2027) for the group.

Speakers included Bill Perrottet, an MCG member, who provided a brief history of the Malpas Catchment Group, from his perspective as a local group member, Bronwyn Cameron, of 2Rog, presented an overview of the Armidale Regional Council Catchment Water Quality Strategic Plan and Pete Fitzgerald provided an overview of his role in facilitating the development of the five-year group action plan including a brief timeline.

Participants were asked to consider, discuss and document their thoughts and ideas based on the following question: "What kinds of activities could the group undertake in the next 5 years" under the following scenarios - if there were "No external funds available for activities", or there were "Unlimited funds available for activities".

A plethora of ideas were forthcoming. For those associated with activities run on non-external funding, suggestions included: publicity with a positive focus on water quality, public engagement, encouraging the local schools to learn about and be involved in riparian management, community and indigenous initiatives, education for landholders to enhance & preserve water quality.

With an unlimited funding scenario,

ideas were emboldened to include catchment erosion control and de-silting dams, satellite imagery of ground cover (time-lapse), tree plantings, benchmarking demonstrations, education awareness & training, inclusion in school curriculum, groundwater research, grant applications etc.

The list of ideas generated by participants can be viewed on the Southern New England Landcare website's Homepage & Latest News webpage.

Next steps in developing the Malpas Catchment Group 5-year action plan meeting will involve the following four key components.

- Sharing of meeting outcomes including the compiled list of activity ideas with

Malpas Catchment Group members.

- Seek feedback and additional ideas from interested members of the community.

- Hold a second workshop to confirm support for, details of, and finalisation of the plan (exact date to be confirmed)

- The finalised plan will be in place by 30th June 2022.

Rural Market Reports

Guyra Sheep & Lamb Sale

February 9th - There was a large reduction in lamb supply to 1600, down 4780 on the previous sale, due to the absence of the large runs of light weight young lambs. Sheep supplies were also down 300 to 950 head.

The quality of the lamb offering was very mixed with limited supplies suitable to processors. Restocker lambs made up a large percentage of the offering. There was restricted processor attendance in both the lambs and the sheep. Restocker demand was again strong with Young Merino lambs selling to a dearer trend.

The crossbred store lambs including some 1st x saw little change in market trends, marginally cheaper if anything. The reduced competition from processors resulted in cheaper trends for those to processors being only slightly cheaper. The quality and condition of the sheep was mixed as was condition.

Varying trends with light weight Merino ewes carrying a spring shorn skin were dearer. The reduced processor competition resulted in cheaper trends for the medium and heavy weight sheep.

Armidale Cattle Sale

February 10th - The numbers increased with the inclusion of a large run of light weight yearlings. Overall the quality of the yarding was very mixed with some very well bred local cattle and quite a few secondary quality agistment yearlings. The condition of the offering was also mixed. There was very little feedlot and processor activity however restockers were active throughout.

Heavy weight vealer steers to restockers sold on a firm to dearer market trend with some quality related price change. The heifer portion much cheaper. Light weight yearling steers to restockers sold to a significantly

dearer trend, taking breed and quality into account. The medium weights sold to cheaper trends with both breed and quality contributing to price change.

The heavy weights saw those to feed sell to a cheaper trend, while those to restockers were dearer. Light weight yearling heifers to restockers posted strong gains on a dearer market trend taking quality into account. Medium and heavy weights saw trends mostly cheaper. Heavy grown steers sold to cheaper trends with restricted processor and feedlot competition. Heavy weight cows also sold to a cheaper trend of as much as 19c/kg under limited processor competition.

Weekly Wool Market

February 11th - The market lost ground upon opening this week following Fremantle's lead from last week. Nearly all micron indicators had lost between 5 and 20 cents at the end of the first day of sales. These losses were repeated and magnified on the final day.

18.5 micron and broader types gave back all of last week's gains and whilst the finer types closed the week cheaper they did manage to hold onto some of last week's gains. The Merino Carding indicator was the best performer and is now almost 20% dearer than the corresponding period last season. 17.4% of this week's offering was passed in as prices fell. Resulting in just over 38,000 bales being sold.

Major buyers included PJ Morris, Tianyu and Sequoia. Next week's national offering jumps substantially in size to 55,800 bales. If they all materialise it will be largest sale for the season to date by a fair margin. The large offering in the Southern region will see sales split over three days. Once again the Fremantle market closed the week on a softer note than the Eastern seaboard with buyers possibly having an eye on the size of next week's estimated national offering.

Horsemanship school a great success

Over the weekend Guyra Polocrosse Club hosted a horsemanship school with visiting instructor Scott Keogh.

Twenty riders attended the two day clinic, ranging in age from 6 to just under 60 (!). Experience varied from raw beginners, to state level polocrosse players, to seasoned challenge competitors.

The clinic was all about improving horsemanship skills

and gaining knowledge of training principles, no matter your equine discipline.

Scott is a professional horse trainer who also travels the country conducting clinics as well as preparing and selling horses at major horse sales like the Nutrien Classic Sale.

The school was such a success, the Club is planning to host another at the start of next year!

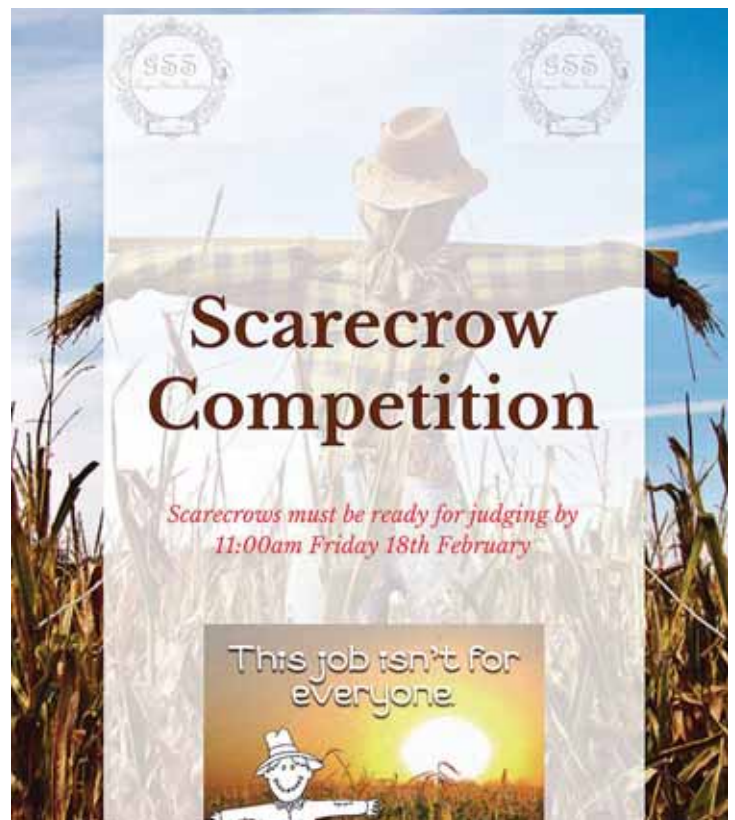
