The mice are back

Farmers are urged to be extra vigilant in coming weeks, with more and more reports of mouse activity in paddocks.

NSW Farmers Vice President, Xavier Martin said there were anecdotal reports of mouse numbers growing in the north of the state, and some farmers had increased baiting in an effort to get ahead of the numbers.

“We need everyone to use their chew cards but also to keep an eye out for mice, and report any rise in numbers,” Mr Martin said.

“The latest official CSIRO-GRDC Mouse Update indicates patchy numbers in NSW that are generally low, but we’re also hearing stories of mice running around farms, so there’s a bit of a mismatch there.

“What we don’t want to see is a repeat of last year’s mouse plague, so please if you see something, say something.”

Regional communities were swarmed last year as a mouse plague chewed its way through millions of dollars’ worth of crops, damaging farm machinery, vehicles and buildings in the process.

People were sickened by ‘carpets’ of mice on highways, and they were even sighted in urban environments



sparkling fears among Sydneysiders of a rodent invasion.

“A NSW Farmers survey last year found a third of respondents estimated losses from the mouse plague worth between \$50,000 and \$150,000, with a loss of grain and fodder having the greatest financial impact,” Mr Martin said.

“We strongly advocated for – and secured – a zinc phosphide bait rebate

from the NSW Government, but we also saw an awful lot of damage caused by the runaway mouse numbers.

“Let’s make sure we all get out of the ute and into the paddock to make sure we avoid another plague.”

A timely reminder on fire safety

Leading into the winter months and before the cold, wet weather sets in, it is a good idea to check your fire safety at home. The following safety checklist was obtained from the website: <https://www.fire.nsw.gov.au>

Home Fire Safety Checklist

Did you know that the areas of the house where most fires occur are the kitchen, sleeping areas, and lounge area?

Are you fire safe in the home?

The fire services recommend this simple safety checklist to assist in keeping your home fire safe.

- Installing an adequate number of suitable smoke alarms and testing them regularly is the first step in your home fire safety plan.
- Having a written escape plan in case of fire and practicing it regularly.
- Make sure keys to all locked doors are readily accessible in case you need to escape.
- Never leave cooking or any other open flame, including candles or oil burners unattended.

- Clean the lint filter of your clothes dryer each and every time you use it.
- Never smoke in bed and take extra care if consuming alcohol whilst smoking.
- In Winter take extra care when using heaters, electric blankets or open fires.
- Don't overload power points and switch off appliances when not in use.
- Always keep lighters and matches away from children and educate them that they are "tools not toys" to only be used by responsible adults.
- If you have a garage or shed remember to take extra care with any stored chemicals and fuels and always refuel mowers, edgers, etc when they are cold and in the open.
- If you have a gas, electric or wood BBQ always check that it is in safe working order before lighting and that it is always in the care of a responsible adult when in use.
- If you live in a bushfire prone area keep the ground around your home clear of leaves and other litter and remember to clean your gutters regularly.



Fire safety tips

- Remember that smoke from a fire will make you confused and that you cannot see in smoke.
 - When asleep, you will not smell smoke and it will in fact put you into a deeper sleep.
 - If you have escaped from a home fire, remember once you get out stay out and dial Triple Zero (000).
 - Oil, gas or wood heating units may require a yearly maintenance check.
 - Only ever use fuses of recommended rating and install an electrical safety switch.
- Stay warm, but stay safe!

The school entered 7 lambs, (3 medium weight, 3 heavy weight and a single led lamb prepared for the show by Brooke Grills).

The students took part in a farmer's challenge on the Tuesday night and our team, including Michael Looker, Ashley Donnelly, Piper Kempton and Billy Lockyer each achieved 3rd place in the challenge. After a very delicious roast lamb and gravy roll dinner, we all camped in the main pavilion.

In the morning the lambs were judged and the single led lamb event was held. Brooke Grills presented her very well behaved lamb, but unfortunately was overlooked by the judge in favour of a rather huge Black Suffolk lamb from Peel High School weighing

72kg on the day.

The students then took part in the junior judging. Students were required to judge four pens of three lambs and provide their preferences. All students handled the sheep well.

Levi Vanderwolf performed exceptionally well in his first competition, reaching the finals and then delivering his judging preferences in front of 120 people. Levi is to be congratulated for the excellent speech he presented in the competition.

All of our students are to be commended for their outstanding behaviour and willingness to have a go at a new skill and to work with students from other schools. It is such a privilege to take our wonderful students on excursion and special thanks to Mr Adrian Cameron for driving the bus, providing extra swags, supervising and encouraging students, handling sheep and for going above and beyond in ALL aspects of his work.

Rural Market Reports

It was another positive week for the market.

An offering of around 8,500 less bales than last week and a more stable currency helped the Northern Region Indicator to an 8 cent rise on the first day of sales. This was followed by a further 15 cent rise on the final day.

The overall market recorded its strongest weekly rise since February and closed the week in the middle of the tight trading band it has occupied since the start of the calendar year.

Once again it was lower vegetable matter better style Merino fleece types that were sought after by the trade.

The individual Micron Price Guides jumped between 7 and 55 cents over both selling days. 37,751 bales were sold nationally for the week.

The passed-in rate at only 6% was less than half the seasonal average and a good indicator of just how strong the market was.

Major buyers included Techwool, PJ Morris & Tianyu with general widespread support from most of the trade.

Forward market prices didn't run as hard as the physical this week, particularly for the finer types which are showing around a 30 cent discount into the second half of the year.

Do you know how to make your vote count?

Federal election, Saturday, 21 May 2022

It's important that you understand how to vote correctly.

On election day you need to complete two ballot papers:

- a green one for the House of Representatives
- a large white one for the Senate.

On the green ballot paper you are voting for a representative of your local area or electorate in the House of Representatives.

On the white ballot paper you are voting for representatives of your state or territory in the Senate.

Don't worry if you make a mistake. Just ask for another ballot paper and start again.

Green ballot paper – number **every** box in the order of your choice

White ballot paper – you can choose to vote either above or below the line
