IPART approves rate increase for the 2022-2023 financial year

The Independent Pricing and Regulatory Tribunal (IPART) has approved an application by Armidale Regional Council to increase rates above the level of the annual rate peg of 0.7%.

The increase to 2.5% was approved following an additional special variation process. Neighbouring councils Glen Innes Severn Council, Inverell Shire Council, and Uralla Shire Council were also granted an increase.

Each year IPART calculate a rate

peg which sets how much councils can increase the revenue they collect from rates.

This year the rate peg was set at a minimum of 0.7 per cent, which was lower than many councils expected. Armidale Regional council said that the cap would have meant an immediate \$350,000 deficit to council's budget.

"The latest rate peg was determined in the low inflation environment at the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic," Tribunal

member Deborah Cope said.

"Since then, high inflation and global uncertainty increased councils' costs. Some councils have demonstrated that without additional funds they will not be able to deliver the projects they have already consulted on and included in their budgets."

The decision to allow councils to increase their rates by a maximum of 2.5 per cent, against an inflation rate expected to reach 7 per cent by December, has been welcomed by

the state's local government sector.

Local Government NSW (LGNSW) President Darriea Turley said the special rate variations announced by IPART acknowledged the dire financial situation created by its initial decision to cap rate rises at 0.7 per cent.

"Without this, many councils would have been forced to choose between cuts to jobs or roads maintenance, parks, libraries and other community infrastructure and services," Ms Turley said.

Record \$636.5 million investment for Northern Tablelands in State Budget

FOR the first time in the electorate's history more than half-a-billion dollars has been allocated in an NSW Budget for projects in the Northern Tablelands, with an expansion of Malpas Dam near Armidale, new hospitals in Moree and Glen Innes, rebuilding the Armidale Kempsey Road and construction of the Moree Special Activation Precinct headlining a record spending blitz in the 2022-23 financial year.

The incredible capital spend of more than \$636,526,000 over the next 12 months is almost double that of last year's record budget (a 45 per cent increase), which saw a mega investment of \$349.52 million in the electorate.

An ecstatic Member for Northern Tablelands Adam Marshall said the delivery of the budget progressed the region's vision for a COVID-19 economic recovery.

"I'm literally pinching myself, that after four consecutive record budgets, this incredible level of expenditure has been almost doubled and delivered for the people of our region," Mr Marshall said.

"This budget propels us on the path to a much more resilient region, building the water infrastructure, hospitals, roads and public facilities that will strengthen our economy for generations to come.

"The funding allocations to increase our health workforce and

boost the number of emergency service boots on the ground will go towards ensuring the health and safety of our communities too.

"I'm thrilled to see the full \$27 million delivered for the raising of the Malpas Dam wall, which will help to mitigate the impact of future droughts on Armidale and Guyra and provide water security.

"Allocations for the Moree and Glen Innes Hospital redevelopments will mean construction can begin early next year.

"This outcome is the result of our proactive local councils and their communities, working together to lobby government for a fair slice of the funding pie.

"This budget really recognises the heavy lifting local businesses and households have done during the pandemic to keep our State open and working.

"Full credit goes to the community, they have earned this result."

Some of the key projects that have been funded in the Northern Tablelands include \$27 million for the raising of Malpas Dam wall, \$80 million for the Moree Hospital build, \$50 million for the redevelopment of Glen Innes Hospital, \$227 million to rehabilitate Armidale Kempsey Road, \$193.9 million to construct the Moree Special Activation Precinct and \$168.7 million joint State and Federal funding for the

upgrade of the Newell Highway, including \$10 million to continue planning the pavement upgrade north of Moree.

Local councils in the electorate will also have the pressure eased on their contribution to road works with almost \$41 million to be provided through grants for maintenance and upgrades. This surpasses last year's Budget allocation of \$32 million.

There will be \$188 million in new roads and bridges funding for the Northern Tablelands, an increase on last year's record allocation of \$140.2 million.

More than 3,400 patients in the Northern Tablelands will benefit from the addition of \$149 million for the Isolated Patients Travel and Accommodation Scheme (IP-TAAS). The rebate will almost double from 22 cents to 40 cents per kilometre for patients who drive in their car more than 100 kilometres for treatment.

Armidale, Glen Innes and Inverell will be amongst some of the first communities in the State to receive new, modern accommodation units for healthcare workers, with the State Government committing \$75 million to increase regional housing options.

The establishment of the \$5 billion Affordable and Accessible Childcare and Economic Participation Fund, will save middle income living in regional NSW

with two children in childcare is expected to save around \$7,800. The fund will provide grants to childcare providers to expand infrastructure, establish new centres and trial new models of delivery.

Paid Parental Leave will be extended to 14 weeks for all public service workers, including nurses, to encourage shared child caring responsibilities.

The new Back to School program will provide families with a \$150 subsidy for each child who attends a primary or secondary school in NSW in 2023. Parents will access the program via Service NSW.

Efforts to fast-track critical energy infrastructure and reduce power bills through the New England Renewable Energy Zone will power ahead, with \$110 million being invested to fast-track new transmission infrastructure in the region to connect new projects.

Another \$1.3 billion will be added to the Regional Growth Fund, allowing for a fifth round of the highly successful and popular Stronger Country Communities Fund (SCCF) to be delivered this calendar year.

"This record \$636 million budget will help move our region forward – we deserve every single cent – and I'll ensure we keep that momentum going across the next 12 months and hopefully beyond," Mr Marshall said.

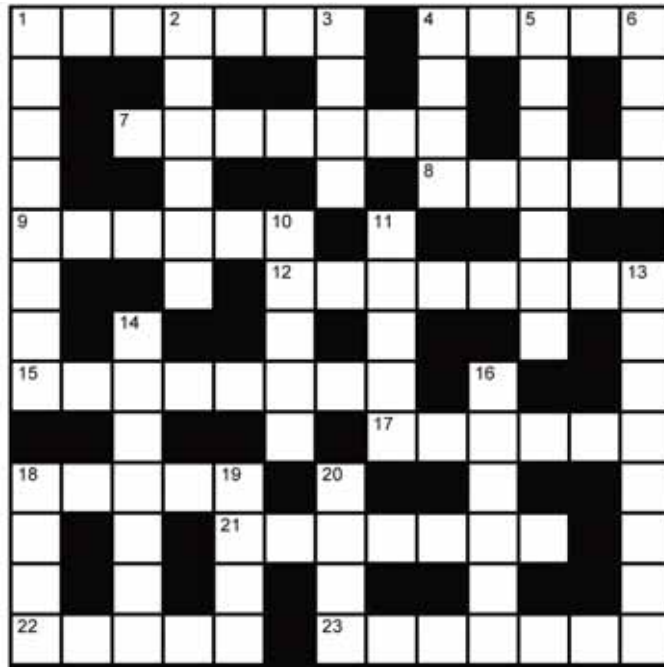

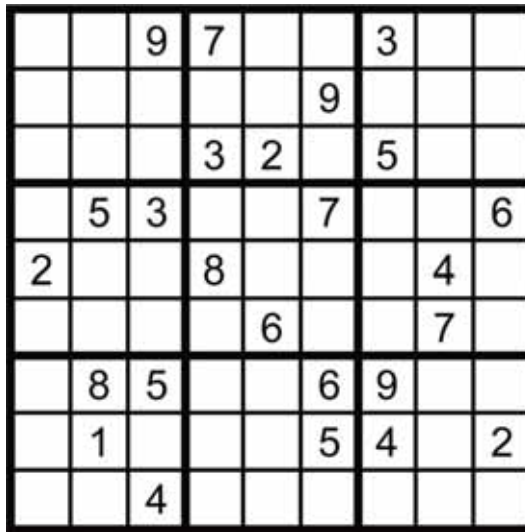

New multiday walk for Dorrigo National Park

A new multi-day walk and a spectacular new visitor centre are proposed as part of a \$56 million investment in Dorrigo National Park.

The Dorrigo project will be one of the first of its kind to combine two new, world-class nature-based attractions – the Arc Rainforest Centre and the multi-day walk – providing access for all abilities to the Gondwana rainforest.”

Located only a stone’s throw

from Glen Innes, Armidale, and Guyra (plus the villages) this project will be another reason for future tourists to visit the area.

The spectacular new multi-day walk was announced as part of a \$56.4 million investment in the NSW Budget.

Minister for Environment James Griffin said the project is part of the largest capital investment program ever undertaken in NSW national parks.

“The rainforest at Dorrigo National Park is even more spectacular than the Daintree, and I’m proud to say that with this magnificent new 46 kilometre walk, and I want everyone who comes to our NSW national parks as a visitor to leave as a conservationist, and this world-class Dorrigo Escarpment Great Walk helps us achieve that,” Mr Griffin said.

The starting point of the Dorrigo Great Walk will be the new

Arc Rainforest Centre, featuring a hanging boardwalk overlooking the World Heritage rainforest. The walk will include four low impact walkers’ hut precincts, new camping areas, three suspension bridges and 46 kilometres of walking trails.

It will also become a place for visitors to learn and connect with the culture of the traditional custodians, the Gumbayngirr people.

Boost to bush patient travel scheme welcomed

More than 3,400 Northern Tablelands patients will benefit from an expansion of the Isolated Patients Travel and Accommodation Assistance Scheme (IPTAAS) over the next 12 months, according to local State MP Adam Marshall, who has welcomed a \$149.5 million boost to the program as part of the 2022-23 NSW Budget.

Under these changes the private vehicle subsidy rate will almost double from 22 cents to 40 cents per kilometre for patients who have to travel more than 100 kilometres for care.

Accommodation rebates will also rise significantly from \$43 per night to \$75 per night for a 1 to 7-day stay and from \$60 per night to

\$120 per night for an 8-plus night stay.

“For many rural and regional patients, IPTAAS is literally a lifeline and I hope this additional investment will ease financial burden on those going through a difficult time in their lives,” Mr Marshall said.

He also welcomed the announcement of an expansion to the scheme’s eligibility for patients attending non-commercial clinical trials, high risk foot clinics, highly specialised publicly funded oral health clinics and ophthalmologists.

“This is great news for these patients who were previously unable to receive help under the scheme.”

Farmers urged to apply for Quad Bike rebates

Farmers have just under 12 months to access the NSW Government’s \$2,000 rebate on side-by-side vehicles and join more than 4,000 customers who have bought a safer alternative to traditional quad bikes.

Minister for Fair Trading Eleni Petinos said further rebates were available to farmers and rural businesses who undertook an eligible SafeWork training course.

“We are encouraging farmers to access these rebates which can go towards the purchase of eligible side-by-side vehicles, roll bars, compliant helmets and drones which can help check stock, fences, and dams,” Ms Petinos said.

“Quad bikes are the biggest killer on Australian farms with roll over the main cause of death, which is why the safety standard was introduced with mandatory roll bars as one of the key elements,” Ms Petinos said.

Minister for Agriculture and Western NSW Dugald Saunders is encouraging producers and processors to apply for the rebates to insure themselves against unnecessary risk.

Rural Market Reports

Weekly Wool Market

June 17th - The market recorded some strong gains this week. The bulk of the rise occurred on Wednesday’s opening of the market with Thursday’s sale consolidating at the higher level.

The Eastern Market Indicator finished the week at its highest level for the season to date and only 1 cent off its highest point since March 2020. The Aussie dollar falling 2.2% against the US almost mirrored the 2% increase in the EMI.

The big winners this week were the fine and medium Merino types, seemingly playing catch up to the superfine types

that have led the market higher. 31,833 bales were sold nationally for the week with a passed in rate of 10.0%.

Major buyers included Techwool, PJ Morris and Tianyu. It could be argued that the wool market has almost completed the COVID cycle. The EMI was at 1521 when COVID was declared a global pandemic in March 2020.

Over the course of 6 months the EMI decreased a staggering 43.5%. The 70% increase in the indicator since then has returned the market to a more normalised trading pattern (chart attached). With no sale in Fremantle next week the national offering dips to just under 31,000 bales.
