# Funds flow for Scout Hall 'facelift'



The Rotary Club of Guyra are getting ready to roll up their sleeves and begin work on a restoration project which will transform the former Guyra Scout Hall into a permanent

home for the club.

The Rotary Club were appointed the Crown Lands Manager for the Hall in November 2023. Last week they received word that they have been successful in their application for a grant from the NSW Government's 2023-24 Crown Reserves Improvement Fund (CRIF).

President of the Rotary Club of Guyra, David Kanaley said the CRIF supports Crown Land Managers by providing funding for repairs, maintenance, and improvements on Crown reserves.

The \$145,079 grant will go towards repairs and upgrades to the building on the corner of Nincoola and White Streets in Guyra. The successful grant application was the work of club members David Kanaley, Wendy Mulligan and Martha


Weiderman.

The proposed works include repairs and upgrades to the foundations, roof, drainage, windows, electrical, and plumbing, as well as asbestos removal and painting. It will also see the construction of a disability access ramp.

This is the biggest project ever undertaken by the club, who are the only Rotary Club in NSW to have been given a Crown Lands asset to manage.

David added that a funding deed detailing grant conditions will be sent to the Club from Crown Lands in the coming weeks. After those matters are signed off work will begin with asbestos removal and a thorough cleaning of the Hall. It is anticipated that it will take up to a year for the project to be completed.

The hall will be used for club meetings and activities, including regular fundraising events such as book fairs. It will also be made available for use by other community groups and organisations.





# First Frost - late but not a record

The first frost of the year was late this year, coming well into the middle of May. Was this a record? Unfortunately, the BoM weather stations don't record frosts – but they do record the daily minimum temperature. We have 43 years of daily minimum temperatures from the Guyra Hospital weather station. Put this together with the commonly used frost threshold of 3degC and we can estimate the date of the first frost each year since records began in 1981.

The earliest date in the year for the first frost was 2nd March, both in 1993 and in 2003. The latest date for the first frost was 22nd May in 1989, which tells us that this year's first frost date did not set any records.

What about the local wisdom that we usually get a frost by Anzac Day each year? The daily minimum temperature data with the 3degC frost threshold says


that for just under 70% of years since 1981, the first frost occurred before Anzac Day. That suggests the local wisdom is pretty close to the mark.

The chances of first frosts occurring before a particular date can be summarised in a graph as shown above.

The graph shows, for example, that there is a 51% chance of the first frost occurring before 15-April. By 15-May, it's a 98% chance – almost a certainty – that the first frost has occurred sometime previous to this date.

Of course, this is all based on historical averages for one weather station. There will be local exceptions around the district. There are sure to be readers who have seen a patch of frost on the car roof in January or February.

# 1080 Aerial and Ground Baiting For Wild Dog & Fox Control 2024

Northern Tablelands Local Land Services, NSW National Parks and Wildlife Service (NPWS) and Forestry Corporation of NSW wish to advise they will be carrying out 1080 poison aerial and ground baiting for wild dog and fox control, commencing 13 May and to be completed by the 30 June 2024.

Baiting will occur on the following Traveling Stock Reserves: TSR R54103 and TSR R55274

1080 baits pose a high risk to domestic dogs. All domestic dogs should be kept under control and away from baiting areas at all times. Advisory signage will be erected prior to baits being deployed.

# **Rural Market Reports**

# Guyra Sheep & Lamb Sale

Guyra Sheep & Lamb Sales are now being conducted fortnightly. On May 28th, there was a yarding of 3431 head, comprising 1703 crossbred lambs, 575 store lambs, 50 merino lambs, 1078 sheep and 25 rams. No market report is currently available for Guyra sales.

Next sale is scheduled for June 11th, commencing at 9am. Contact your preferred agent for all enquiries.

# **Armidale Cattle Sale**

May 30th - Total Yarding: 1380 (-620). There was a significant fall in numbers despite the colder months just around the corner. The quality of the offering was very mixed with some good quality restocker and feeder cattle available. The regular buyers were in attendance.

Market trends varied through the young cattle with restocker steer weaners selling on a generally firm trend with some quality related price change. The heifer portion were less keenly sought with a cheaper trend throughout. Yearlings steers were well supported with the light and medium weights firm to slightly dearer.

The heavy weight feeders also saw a firm to slightly dearer trend. There were cheaper trends through the yearling heifers with competition not as strong. Too few heavy grown steers to quote. The well finished grown heifers to process sold to a dearer trend while those to feed were cheaper. There was a substantial fall in the cow market

with processor demand well down. Restockers however were again active in the plainer condition lines. The bull market followed a similar trend.

### **Weekly Wool Sales**

Like last week the national offering fell 4,000 bales short of what was expected with just 35,500 bales being offered. It is anticipated that this figure will continue to shrink even further over the next fortnight with estimates of 33,000 bales and 28,000 bales expected. These low national offerings are not unusual for this time of year and are following the long established predictable seasonal offering pattern.

The first day of sales opened relatively unchanged on last week's quotes but had lost 6 cents upon closing. The Northern region indicator remained unchanged on the final day with the finer Merino types gaining less than a handful of cents. 33,310 bales were sold nationally for the week with a passed in rate of 6.2%.

Chinese interests continue to dominate proceedings in the sale rooms with the top 4 buyers purchasing over 55% of this week's Merino fleece offering. Total bales offered for the season to date is on par with last season but the lower passed in rate has led to 59,000 additional bales sold.

The headline market indicators have bounced off this week's closing level 3 times this season with Wednesday's unchanged market offering hope that the trend will continue.


