Nationals retain Northern Tablelands

Brendan Moylan has been elected by a comfortable margin to become the new member for Northern Tablelands in the NSW Parliament.

While votes are still being counted it appears that he will be elected with similar results to that which were achieved by outgoing member Adam Marshall at the last election, retaining the seat's status as the safest in the State.

Mr Moylan has received 69.68% of votes on first preference counts to date, and is standing on 86.9% of the vote after the distribution of preferences. The poll will be officially declared on July 10th.

Mr Moylan said he was humbled by the result and by the level of community support across the electorate.

"I have spent the last seven weeks travelling across Northern Tablelands meeting with locals in communities and towns and hearing what matters most to them," Mr Moylan said.

"While each community has its own challenges, the key issues raised with me as I traversed the electorate were access to healthcare, the cost of living, and law and order.

"I thank the voters of Northern Tablelands for placing their trust in me. They can rest assured I will do all I can to continue Adam Marshall's hard work in fighting for our communities right across the region."

The Guyra Garden Club moved indoors for their June meeting, offering members a range of demonstrations and talks suitable to the time of year.

The highlight of the meeting was the presentation of a cheque for \$1000 to the Westpac Rescue Helicopter Service (WRHS). The funds were raised by the club through their plant stall at the Guyra Christmas Carnival.

Tamworth based WRHS regional partnerships officer Daniel Gillet was in attendance at the meeting to accept the donation. He also took the chance to update club members on the work carried out by the helicopter service.

Mr Gillet highlighted the fact that the WRHS is the only service providing aeromedical services in Northern NSW and as a result of their work 1650 lives were saved last year alone. Each of the services four helicopters is well equipped for medical emergencies and they have a highly trained doctor and paramedic on board who can act immediately to give lifesaving treatment.


He also said that the WRHS is increasingly being called on to fill the

gap in health services in smaller communities and are often being called on to transport patients from small hospitals to larger hospitals to access specialist services. More often than not they are better equipped than many of regions smaller hospitals.

"It is humbling to make the trip up to Guyra and accept this donation," Mr Gillet said.

"Every donation from community groups such as the Garden Club makes a difference to people in regional communities that rely on the services that we provide. "One third of our funding comes through sponsorship and donations so we appreciate every dollar raised on our behalf.."

Following the cheque presentation members, including three new recruits, were able to learn tool sharpening skills from Peter Thorneycroft. They then moved on to the Community Garden to enjoy lunch provided by the Neighbourhood Centre. Ms Gibbens said the program is also worthwhile for people who are considering starting up for the first time – 20 per cent of inquiries come from clients intending to enter the business world with a new product or business idea

According to Service NSW, the Business Connect program has achieved a 96 per cent approval rating from small businesses that it has assisted to date.

Farmers better equipped for changing climate

UNE together with Landcare groups, Southern New England Landcare and GLENRAC Inc., delivered a series of Calculating Carbon workshops, as part of the Drought Resilient Pasture Landscapes (DRPL) project, that educated landholders on sustainable farming and the potential benefits it can have on productivity, profits and emissions.

Hosted by Dr Tom Davison, a leading expert in livestock production, methane emissions and greenhouse gas emissions reduction research, the workshops taught participants from how to calculate greenhouse gas emissions from their farm and estimate their annual output.

Project lead Professor Lewis Kahn said that practices that lower greenhouse gas emissions form part of good farm management and have benefits for both sustainability and productivity.

"The topic of carbon is complex, and farmers need to understand not only the drivers of change but the various practices to reduce emis-

sions and the international and local regulations, financial markets, and supply chain pressures," said Professor Kahn.

"These workshops aimed to better equip farmers with improved knowledge to make informed decisions about participating in the carbon economy."

Participants were also provided


with practical strategies to implement on farm to reduce carbon. These strategies include better efficiency of production through higher rates of reproduction and growth rates in beef cattle herds, using feed additives such as nitrate, anti-methane products, oils and tannins, breeding for lower methane emissions, using legumes

and novel forages, environmental plantings, and storing soil carbon. Growers gave a very positive review of the workshops, identifying how much they learned and the value of having calculated their annual farm greenhouse gas emissions.

Since December 2022, the DRPL project has been working with farmers across the Northern Tablelands through an on-farm coaching program to better equip them to navigate climate variability and drought conditions using a range of indicators for productivity success, including pasture herbage mass, ground cover, and soil organic matter, that also provide public benefit through reduced weeds, erosion and rainfall runoff.

With the project ending in June, key information will be transferred into a free online resource that will be publicly available from July.



Rural Market Reports

Guyra Sheep and Lamb Sale

June 18th - There was a yarding of 1838 head, comprising 793 XBred Lambs, 140 Store Lambs, 40 Merino Lambs and 865 Sheep.

No market report is currently being produced for the Guyra Sale.

Next sale is scheduled to be held on Tuesday July 2nd contact your preferred agent for details.

Armidale Cattle Sale

June 20th - Armidale penned 400 mixed cattle, back 985 on the previous sale.

Plainer cattle dominated however pens of well-bred yearlings and weaners suited feeder and background operators. Less quality and a lack of numbers reduced buying power to result in cheaper trends for the most part.

Well-bred weaner steers sold to 394c/kg, most steer weaners sold to cheaper trends. The tops of the heifer weaners were 7c/kg back making 218c to 270c/kg.

Quality improvement for light background steers saw a rise of 11c/kg. Similar rises for medium steers 320c to 390c/kg. Plainer yearling heifers under 330kgs were considerably cheaper with medium weights to similar trends.

Grown heifers to restockers sold 144c to 158c/kg. Medium cows 4c/kg dearer. Heavy cows

bore the brunt of the correction 159c to 190c/kg.

Weekly Wool Sales

June 21 - After three weeks of gains and reaching a two month high the market gave back some ground this week.

The Northern region indicator lost 3 cents on the first day of sales and another 9 cents on the final day. The losses were largely confined to the finer Merino fleece types. Cardings were slightly dearer as was the 20 micron indicator with Skirtings reported as generally unchanged.

It was a small national offering with the Western region still on a fortnightly sale rotation. 25,318 bales were sold nationally for the week with the passed in rate at the season average of 7.9%.

Major buyers included Techwool, Endeavour Wool and Tianyu. The closing value of the Northern region indicator this week at 1198 cents is bang on the average for the season.

Next week's sale is the last for the 2023/24 financial year with the expected national offering rising to above 40,000 bales. A similar amount is expected for the first sale of the new season in the following week.

It's been a very stable and almost uneventful season price wise with less than 10% movement separating the highest and lowest level that the Eastern market indicator has traded at over the past 12 months.
