Guyra Mill changes hands

AFTER three years of ownership, Mort & Co has sold the Guyra Stockfeed Mill to Summit Milling.

The Guyra mill manufactures a range of products to support the supplementary feeding requirements of livestock and poultry producers.

It was established by the Vivers family, and since 2007 has been producing high-quality stockfeed.

It currently has a capacity of 20,000 tonnes per annum and supplies pellets in bulk, and 20kg, 500kg, and 1-tonne bags.

The sale will see Summit Milling purchase the site and its physical assets, including the mill, delivery trucks, and some additional equip-

While Mort & Co customers will be required to open a new account with Summit Milling to continue trading, there is expected to be little disruption to the business, and the mill will remain open during the change of ownership.

"We look forward to taking the reins of the Guyra Stockfeed Mill and maintaining the high standards Mort & Co established," Summit Milling managing director Kevin Sherrie said.

"Mort & Co is to be congratulated on its service to the New England region, and for

commitment to producing marketleading, nutritionally stockfeed."

Mort & Co chief executive officer Stephen O'Brien said the acquisition was a positive outcome for everyone.

"The Guyra mill is an important business for the region, employing local people and delivering products essential to the success of many farming businesses," Mr O'Brien said.

"I'd like to take this opportunity

to thank our suppliers, staff and customers for their loyalty.

"We are thrilled to be able to hand over to a family-run local company which shares similar values to the Mort & Co business.

"We know Robvn Kevin. and their daughter Katherine, along with the Summit Milling team, will ensure the Guyra mill continues its proud history of servicing the region."

Mr Sherrie thanked Mort & Co for working "proactively and collaboratively" with Summit Milling throughout the transaction.

"It's an exciting time ahead as the Guyra Stockfeed Mill is under the ownership of our family busi-

"We are pleased to be able to support local employment and the continued growth of Guyra into the future."

Mr Sherrie has a long involvement with the flour-milling industry, and in 2004 established FPM Cereal Milling Systems at Tam-

While Mr Sherrie has managed stockfeed mills in New Zealand prior to the establishment of FPM, this is the first investment the family has made in stockfeed milling.

The acquisition was finalised on September 1st.



How to make your vote count

Pre poll voting will commence this Saturday, September 7th and continue until Friday September 13th (excluding Sunday).

Voting centres will be open at the Guyra Community Hall and the Armidale Town Hall for pre poll as well as on election day September 14th.

Black Mountain Public school will also be open on election day only for voting.

There are 39 candidates in total standing for election to Armidale Regional Council.

Thirty four of the candidates are

members of six groups who have banded together according to their common beliefs. They are listed at the top of the ballot paper.

A further five independent candidates are going it alone and they are listed on the right hand side of the ballot paper.

To ensure your vote counts you must follow the instructions on the ballot paper. You can either vote for groups above the line <u>or</u> individuals below the line.

If you choose to vote above the line, place a number one in the box

of the group that you want to vote for. By doing so you are effectively voting for the group candidates in order of appearance on the ballot paper.

You only need to vote for one group, but may also choose to vote consecutively for other groups above the line.

Voting below the line allows you to vote for candidates from multiple groups and also those who are not part of any group.

If you vote below the line you are required to place the numbers 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 in the squares opposite

the names of five candidates.

If you wish to vote for more candidates you can place consecutive numbers beginning with the number 6.

It is important to note that the five candidates listed on the far right side of the ballot paper are not part of a group and you cannot vote for them above the line.

All candidates were given the opportunity to contribute information for this feature. Four candidates, Joshua Fittler, Natasha Ledger, Jenny Wild and Bradley Widders, have chosen not to provide details.

Rural Market Reports

Guyra Sheep and Lamb Sale

August 27th – Yarding of 4146 comprised of XB Lambs 1435, Store Lambs 1163, Merino Lambs 610, Hoggets 23, Sheep 915

Armidale Cattle Sale

August 29th - A total of 992 head yarded, Averaging \$1326.75 per head and 339.44 c/kg.

The numbers almost doubled as access to yards dried out. The quality of the offering was very mixed with some good lines of quality cattle to suit restockers and feeders along with plainer lots.

The condition of the offering showed a great variation with some very well finished grown cattle to suit processors as well as a run of plain quality light conditioned manufacturing steers.

Light weight steers were keenly

sought by restockers heading into what looks to be an outstanding season. Both the weaners and the yearlings sold to dearer trends. The few medium weights also attracted strong competition from restockers and feedlotters to sell to a dearer trend also.

Heavy weight feeder steers sold to a cheaper trend with some breed related price change also. Light and medium weight yearling heifers sold to dearer trends with some well bred heifers in forward condition presented.

The manufacturing steers sold strongly in comparison to the well finished good quality lines. There is no like for like comparison available from the last sale. Feeder steers with 2 or more teeth attracted strong demand despite a large number in the light weight class.

Well finished, good quality heavy grown steers saw processor

competition very strong with a much dearer market trend the result. That strong processor demand carried into the grown heifers and cows with market trends also dearer. The bull market was firm to slightly dearer taking quality into account.

Weekly Wool Market

August 30th - For the third year in a row the market has struggled post mid-year recess. Quantity on offer cannot be to blame this season with fewer than 40,000 bales available nationally this week.

The Northern region indicator fell 16 cents on Tuesday's opening with only the 17 micron indicator registering a small gain. Prices continued to go backwards on Wednesday but not to same extent of the previous day.

Weekly declines in individual

micron indicators ranged from 12 to 45 cents with the Merino Carding indicator remaining unchanged. 35,100 bales were sold nationally for the week with the passed in rate climbing to 11.9%.

Major buyers included Tianyu, Endeavour Wool and Sequoia. The headline market indicators closed the week at their lowest levels since October 2020. The market was in recovery mode back then after the Eastern market indicator had fallen to 858 in September 2020 during the height of the world's Covid lockdowns

Talk of interest rate cuts being not far off in Europe and the US should hopefully spark an increase in consumer confidence and discretionary spending. With the Northern hemisphere's Summer almost finished it could be an opportunistic time for the industry.
