Results are in for council election

Counting in the local government election wrapped up on Monday, with the nine councillors to represent Armidale Regional for the next four years now finalised.

Incumbent Mayor Sam Coupland and his team were the big winners, securing around 48% of the formal vote and with four places confirmed on the new council.

Todd Redwood, Paul Gaddes and Kay Endres all got over the line on the Group D ticket, however Guyra local Jane Mactier fell just short after the allocation of preferences and will not be part of council this term.

Also returning for another term will be Labor's Susan McMichael, the Green's Dorothy Robinson, and Brad Widders.

Newcomers Eli Imad and Rob Taber will round out the council.

The big loser at this election was Margaret O'Connor's group F, who failed to secure a spot with

Mr Coupland is expected to throw his hat back into the ring as Mayor.

Other events include the Art Show, Metal to Masterpiece


amongst vintage cars, and the hugely popular tours of coolclimate Guyra district gardens.



Wildlife Tails SWOOPING SEASON IS NIGH!



Last week I sat and watched a small toddler as he doggedly pursued an adult Magpie, round and round some bushes, in an Armidale park. I was impressed by the child's tenacious fascination as he wobbled after the bird, matched only by the tolerance of the bird as it patiently circled, keeping a few metres ahead of its pursuer.

The child's mother, occasionally intervening when the child got too far away, finally took up the child and left.

I wondered at our fascination and general love for these birds, with their beautiful carolling call, vivacious temperament and admiration for their courage in defence of their young.

Most people have experienced a particularly notorious, protective parent Magpie who makes a walk or stroll in a park, a harrowing ordeal.

Each year, wildlife rescuers are presented with "orphan" baby Magpies, rescued by overly cautious people, genuinely concerned about the welfare of these "helpless babies".

The truth is that it is natural for baby magpies to leave the nest early, hopefully with advanced wing feathers, enough to enable it to flutter into low shrubs and trees at night. Invariably, the parents are present and are well aware of their babies whereabouts.

Many of these babies are not in need of rescue and are far better off being left with their parents. They can do a far better job of raising them than any carer can do.

Taking them into care disrupts their family structures and territorial instincts.

Last year, I raised 6 babies together and all were finally released for day flights and food gathering and all returned at night to be fed and locked up for their safety. Two went off with the local wild mob, one was predated by a raptor (I think?), one drowned and two are still here.

The two remaining birds come for a few tidbits each evening but



are fully self-reliant to feed themselves.

So, what is best?

If we see a baby magpie on the ground, the first reaction should be to observe the bird. Is it just after a storm when a very small baby is lost from the nest? Are the parents actively caring for the baby? Is your presence keeping the parents away? Are there cats and dogs nearby that are causing a danger? Have kids been harassing the baby? Is it obviously injured?

All this needs to be taken into

account before we interfere. Phoning your local wildlife group for advice, can allay your fears and there are alternatives that can be tried. The babies can be placed in a makeshift nest made of wicker baskets, wire hanging baskets or colanders, with some branches and grass lining and cable tied into suitable positions. This is often a better alternative to rescue.

That said, if a Magpie baby is in obvious danger, it should be placed in a cardboard box in a quiet place, not fed or watered and a call made to your local wildlife group. We can then assess the situation and the appropriate measures taken.

This way we can all continue to enjoy the dawn chorus and antics of these intelligent and fascinating birds.

Rural Market Reports

Weekly Wool Market

September 27th - Low weekly national offerings continue to be the trend as does tepid demand. After 10 selling weeks into the 24/25 season just 38 cents separates the high and low point of the Eastern market indicator. This week's closing level equals the previous low point seen at the end of August.

A 3 cent fall in the Northern region indicator on Tuesday was followed by a further 11 cent decline on Wednesday. In US dollar terms the market climbed 6 cents, but it too remains stagnant with just 20 cents separating the high and low point for the season to date. 28,292 bales were sold nationally for the week with the passed in rate

climbing slightly to 8.9%.

Major buyers included Tianyu (purchasing almost 23% of the Merino fleece offering) Sequoia and Endeavour Wool.

33,949 bales are expected to be on offer nationally next week with bales offered for the season to date falling further behind last season. 94,000 fewer bales have been offered during the first 10 selling weeks.

Some activity on the forward market this week with 19 microns changing hands for January 2026 at 1500 cents (173 cents above this weeks close).

Armidale Cattle Sale

September 26th - A total of 1,183 head yarded, Averaging \$1221.91 per head and 301.49 c/kg. The current state of the cattle market led to the largest Spring offering for quite sometime.

It was however a very mixed quality penning showing a great deal of variation in condition. There was an increased presence in the restocker and feedlot buying rankss while there was less processor representation.

Quality and breed were major contributors in the cheaper prices seen in the young cattle with market trends also weaker. The straight bred light and medium weight yearling steers held up reasonably well whereas the secondary quality and mixed breed lines were quite a bit cheaper.

This trend continued in to the light and medium weight yearling heifers with the exception being a single line of very light weights.

There was a very plain quality offering of Manufacturing steers penned.

Comparatively speaking they sold quite well to the well bred well finished heavy grown steers. Those heavy grown steers sold to a slightly cheaper trend. The well finished grown heifers also sold to a slightly cheaper trend with some age and quality related price change.

Restocker cows sold to on a firm to dearer market trend. The medium weights to process saw a firm to slightly dearer trend. The well finished heavy weight cows followed a similar trend. Heavy bulls carrying plenty of condition were well supplied with market trends generally cheaper while a quality improvement lifted some averages.



Guyra Warmer than Armidale?

Well, certainly not if we just look at the average daily maximum temperature. According to the BoM figures, the Guyra Hospital weather station has an average maximum of 17.8 degC while the figure for the Armidale Tree Group Nursery in Mann St is 20.4 degC. So the average daily maximum temperature is 2.6 degC cooler in Guyra compared to Armidale.

However, when we look at the average daily minimum temperature, there is a hint of something interesting going on. The average for Guyra Hospital is 6.6 degC, compared to 6.3 degC for Armidale Tree Group Nursery. So Guyra's average daily minimum temperature is 0.3 degC warmer than Armidale's.


Since it's the difference in average of daily minima that is unexpected, let's look at the The winter temperatures. average daily minimum temperature in winter (June -August) for Guyra Hospital weather station is 1.3 degC, and for Armidale Tree Group Nursery it is 0.1 degC. Again, Guyra's average is warmer than Armidale's average, this time by 1.2 deg C.

With Guyra being some 300 metres higher than Armidale, we would expect Guyra's winter minimum to be colder than Armidale's on average. Perhaps it's something to do with the wind, so let's look at the temperatures and wind together.

use We can the observations published by the BoM, which include the wind direction and speed. A bubble plot is handy for showing the overall picture hidden in a lot of data. In the bubble plot pictured, each bubble represents a winter's morning in 2023 or 2024. For example, the blue bubble near the bottom with an arrow pointing to it is the 1st of August, 2024.

At 9am on that morning, the temperature at Guyra Hospital was 3.6 deg C (follow the

horizontal grey dotted line) and at Armidale Tree Group Nursery it was 7.0 deg C (follow the vertical grey dotted line). The size of the bubble is proportional to the wind speed at that time and the colour shows the For our example direction. morning of the 1st of August 2024, the wind speed at Guyra Hospital was 26 km/h, coming from due south. So the bubble representing this morning is moderately large and blue. With this way of plotting the morning temperatures, all the bubbles above the 45 degree line (the pale pink area) are the mornings when Guvra was warmer than Armidale. All the bubbles below the 45 degree line (the pale blue area) are when Guyra was colder than Armidale. The further a bubble is away from the 45

degree line, the greater the temperature difference between Guyra and Armidale.

Straight away we can see that the mornings when Guyra is colder than Armidale tend to have strong winds from the west round to the north (the large yellow, brown and red bubbles below the 45 degree line. The mornings when Guyra is warmer than Armidale tend to have light winds or calm conditions (the small bubbles and squares above the 45 degree line).

There are two possible reasons for these differences. The first reason is what is known as adiabatic cooling and heating. When the wind comes over the Guyra plateau from the west or northwest, the air cools due to the decrease in pressure with increasing altitude. Then, as the

air descends from Guyra down to Armidale, it heats up again, due to the increase in pressure with decreasing altitude. explains why Guyra is cooler than Armidale on windy days. However, on still nights or early mornings, there is a second reason that comes into play. Known as cold air drainage, on still winter nights, the cold air close to the ground drains off the higher parts of the landscape, and down into the valleys. This leaves the higher parts, like the Guyra plateau, warmer than in the valleys, like Armidale.

So, is Guyra warmer than Armidale? Not on average, but on most still winter nights up round the Guyra Hospital weather station, it certainly is.
