Hunt on for new General Manager

Armidale Regional Council (ARC) General Manager James Roncon will not seek a fifth year of his contract. Mr Roncon announced last week that he will resign on January 10th, 2025 to make way for a new General Manager to drive the long-term vision of the newly elected Council.

In a statement, Mr Roncon said he is extremely proud of what Team ARC has achieved during his tenure and the significant progress made on the organisation's transformational culture journey.

"This has been a difficult and emotional decision to arrive at but one I believe to be in the best interests of ARC and the region.

"With a new Council having been sworn in on October 9th, it is only fair that they have a General Manager (GM) committed to the long-term vision they will seek to drive.

"My decision will provide Council the opportunity to recruit my replacement early in their term and allow them to progress that vision with a new GM at the helm, for the length of their elected term. It's the right thing for me to do."

"My focus over the next three months will be to support the new council's induction to elected life and assist where I can with the recruitment process."

Mayor Sam Coupland said he would be very sad to see James leave the organisation and wanted to acknowledge the indelible legacy James has left on

the Armidale region.

"James came to ARC with a brief to turn around an ailing organisation and he has certainly achieved that. Through his leadership ARC is now, by almost every objective measure, a high performing council which is a far cry from where we were only four years ago.

"For so many reasons James leaves very big shoes to fill and I sincerely wish him all the best for the next chapter, whatever that may be."

The Monckton Aquatic Centre boasts a variety of facilities, including a lap pool, leisure pool, splash park, canteen facilities and a comprehensive range of options for seniors to stay active. Facilities at Guyra Pool include a canteen, a fantastic splash pool as well as a 25metre undercover

pool.

To gain free access community members need to provide a proof of age card or document at the entry and staff will issue a usage pass to be used for future visits.

Free mulch for residents

With spring well and truly in the air, local garden gurus have the opportunity to bring their gardens into full bloom and save water by accessing free mulch.

As part of Armidale Regional Council's (ARC) water conservation campaign, the free mulch pick-up will be available to all residents on the weekend of October 26 and 27 at the Council's Waste Management Facilities in Guyra and Armidale.

The free mulch initiative has been running for several years and was introduced by ARC to encourage water savings in the garden as the warmer months arrive.

"Together, we can make a significant difference to our environment with initiatives like these," said Mayor Sam Coupland.

"The Armidale region is renowned for its beautiful gardens and the free mulch offering from Council will help residents use water more wisely but still have vibrant, lovely looking gardens.

"Mulch can reduce evaporation from the soil by up to 70 percent and is like a blanket on the soil. Not only do mulches conserve water which means there's less need to irrigate, they also keep the soil a consistent temperature, reduce weed growth and, over time, improve the soil structure and the health of plants.

"Mulch is an essential com-

ponent of maintaining a water efficient garden. By shading the soil, mulches help to conserve soil moisture, reducing the amount you have to water by as much as two-thirds.

"These types of simple changes can make a huge difference to the amount of water a household uses. In the warmer months, it is important that water usage and conserving water is top of our agenda."

The mulch giveaway will be limited to residential users and one ute or trailer load per customer. The ARC Waste Management Facilities are open Saturday and Sunday 12 noon 5pm (no entry after 4.45pm).

Region chiselling out a place as top tourism hotspot

The Armidale region was the place to be on the October long weekend as the city and surrounds buzzed with energy, attracting thousands of visitors for a lineup of sensational events.

From the rousing Cold Chisel concert to the Australian Orienteering championships and annual Guyra Trout Festival – more than 11,000 people visited the area over the long weekend bringing more than \$3 million in economic benefit to the Armidale region.

From sold out accommodation to busy clubs, pubs, shops and cafes - the influx of people visiting Armidale for the Cold Chisel concert saw an economic boom for the region.

Not to be outdone, the Australian Orienteering Championships – which was held in the region from September 28 to Oc-

tober 6 – brought more than 1,000 competitors and organisers to the region.

The 2024 Guyra Trout Fest – a three-day event that celebrates the opening of the trout fishing season and showcases local Guyra attractions including Costa Tomato Farm tours, open gardens, vintage cars, markets and fishing clinics – was also deemed a success.

In recognition of their first gig in 1974, the Cold Chisel 50th Anniversary Tour kicked off in Armidale on the October long weekend and attendees – from as far away as the US and New Zealand – came together at Petersons winery for a truly memorable concert.

"Our region had an incredible October long weekend, with three major events drawing in visitors from across the region and beyond," said Armidale Regional Council Mayor Sam Coupland.

"The region's growing reputation for live music events, contributed to our ability to attract such a major event. There was such a buzz around the Cold Chisel concert and the connection with Armidale gave the event so much more meaning.

"Council was also instrumental in attracting the 2024 Australian Orienteering

Championships to the area and it brought with it significant visitor activity. And once again, the annual Guyra Trout Festival also proved to be a big tourist drawcard for the region.

"I'm proud of how Council, local businesses and the broader community came together to make these events happen, and it's a fantastic demonstration of what we can achieve when we host events that put Armidale on the map."

The University of New England (UNE) opened up its residential colleges to help provide extra accommodation services over the October Long Weekend with many patrons sharing how they fulfilled childhood dreams and relived past student experiences

Guyra also saw significant economic benefits over the long weekend with the influx of visitors and locals attending the annual Trout Festival.

Building the Tingha community spirit

TINGHA's art gallery will be given a much-needed \$11,498 boost for mobile display stands, wall hangers, a coffee machine and table and chairs.

Member for Northern Tablelands Brendan Moylan said the project came about after the devastating 2019 fires that ripped through Tingha, and the organisation was formed to decide what could be done to help the community through this sad and hard time.

"The Building the Tingha Community Spirit Aboriginal Corporation has 45 financial members undertaking different roles to keep the organisation viable and the community active," Mr Moylan said.

"Their art gallery is a little gem, attracting artists from near and far to Tingha and allowing locals to share the town's creative spirit.

"The funding was announced in the latest round of the Community Building Partnership, and will help cater for workshops, events, and special occasions.

"Well done to Secretary Deb and the hardworking team on this grant."

Tingha Community Spirit Aboriginal Corporation (BTTC-SAC) Deb Ross said they were excited for the funding boost.

"Tingha is an awesome small community that has had to deal with more than their share of hardships," Ms Ross said.

"BTTCSAC strive to showcase the talents and culture of the community.

"We promote Aboriginal culture, for example, through Droonoodoo Cultural Immersion Tours; Art and Ecology imparts information and tours to groups and individuals.

"We aim to help improve opportunities for the youth of the community." It will take one year to get the building prepared and eighteen months to get the art gallery fully functional. All contractors are volunteers or are associated with Tingha Buffalo Lodge, JoblinkPlus, Local Land Service, and Gymac Landcare.

Rural Market Reports

Weekly Wool Market

October 18th - The rise in the market over the previous fortnight led to a 9,000 bale increase in the weekly offering. In a positive sign this was largely absorbed by the trade however it did pause the upturn.

The Northern region indicator lost 1 cent on both selling days with the 19 micron indictor outperforming the rest of the market. AWEX report that it was the lower style, strength and higher vegetable matter types that dragged the market slightly down.

The better style sound types

sold to levels similar to that of last week's close. 39,098 bales were sold nationally for the week with the passed in rate climbing back to the seasonal average of 8%.

Major buyers included Techwool, Endeavour Wool and PJ Morris with a fairly even spread in the buying pattern. Next weeks expected national offering falls back around 4,500 bales to 36,553.

This week's sale was only the second time this season that the national offering exceeded the corresponding sale last season. This has led to almost 110,000 fewer bales offered for the season to date. Equating to a drop of 20.9%.
