Spring Garden Trail 'truly astounding'

The numbers are still being finalised, but there is no doubt that the New England Garden Festival (NEGF) has been an outstanding success.

Physical ticket sales for the main event held in Armidale over the weekend were around 4500, but organisers expect that number to rise once digital ticket sales are added to the final tally.

While Armidale was the centre of the event, organisers worked hard to make it an event that would benefit the whole region by encouraging visitors to visit a trail of gardens extending from Walcha up to Tenterfield.

NEGF President Lou Forsythe said that they are absolutely thrilled with the result and she is delighted to see the garden trail going gangbusters.

"People are loving the chance to get together and are going from town to town visiting gardens along the way," she said.

"It is not surprising because Armidale has always had beautiful gardens, but so do the surrounding towns like Guyra, Uralla, Walcha, Glen Innes, all the way up to Tenterfield.

"Gardens unite us all, and we hoped people would be supportive of the Garden Trail idea, but to see the number of people who have



completed the trail is astounding.

"I've enjoyed meeting people from all over. There are three sisters who have come down from Central Queensland on a week's holiday together and they are going from town to town, staying overnight, eating out and visiting all the gardens.

"The Guyra gardens on Monday were simply stunning and I haven't heard a bad word from anyone. Gardening is truly something that brings people together rather than dividing them and that was so evident as I wondered through these beautiful gardens."

The NEGF is a not for profit event with profits this year directed towards Can Assist. Guyra members assisted on the weekend and also manned the gardens on Monday.

President Wendy Jackson said that there were around 300 people who visited Julie and Kerry Gittoes' garden and around 200 at the other gardens belonging to John and Barbara Ross and Tony Duke.

"There is no doubt that this is a

great event, and it is in no small way due to the efforts of organisers and the generosity of the gardeners who open their gates to let the visitors in," Wendy said.

Garden enthusiasts won't have to wait another year to visit New England's beautiful gardens with an autumn garden trail being planned for next year.

It is anticipated that 18 cold climate gardens will be open to the public across the region commencing on Thursday, April 28th, 2025.

ARC Community Grants now open

Applications for two Community Grants from the Armidale Regional Council (ARC) will open on November 1. These grants aim to provide financial support for community projects and initiatives that require modest funding to meet local needs and boost community engagement.

These may include funding for building communities and recreational opportunities, celebrating culture and creativity, ensuring environmental sustainability or supporting economy and business.

Local not-for-profit groups and organisations that support and provide services to the Armidale regional community are eligible to apply for: • Community Small Grants - up to \$2000

• Community Support Grants -\$2000 to \$5000

Applicants must:

• Demonstrate that the proposed project will bring tangible benefits to residents of the Armidale Regional Council local government area.

• Adhere to the required Work Health and Safety policies and practices as mandated by legislation.

• Maintain appropriate and upto-date insurance coverage.

• Hold any necessary certificates when required, such as Police Checks, Working with Children Checks, or Working at Heights certification. • Have successfully fulfilled all previous grant conditions and have no outstanding debts to the Council.

• Complete and submit an online Grant Application by the specified due date.

This round of grants opens on November 1 and closes on November 20.

"Empowering local organisations with the resources they need through grants like these is essential for building a vibrant, engaged community," said ARC Mayor Sam Coupland.

"Every project funded through our community grants program is a step towards a stronger Armidale. We encourage all eligible groups to apply and see how an ARC grant can help make your community project or community group flourish."

ARC offers community grant rounds every year. Upcoming grant opportunities are promoted on the Grants and Sponsorship page on council's website.

Successful community grants in the last round went towards projects including the New England Sings Choral Showcase, an Armidale movie day, NAIDOC Week disco and music camp, community gardens, and the Black Gully Festival.


Wonderful experience at New England Sings



Join RSL sub-Branch for Remembrance Day on Monday, November 11th

The Guyra RSL sub-Branch will hold a brief Remembrance Day service at the Soldiers Memorial Hall in Bradley Street, commencing at 10.45am on Monday, 11th November.

Members of the community are invited to attend as a show of respect for all our servicemen and women who served in all conflicts. Each year on this day, Australians observe one minute's silence at 11.00am in memory of those who died or suffered in all wars and armed conflicts.

The First World War ended more than a century ago. At 5am on 11 November 1918 in a railway carriage in France, representatives of France, Britain and Germany all signed a document that would put an end to four years of conflict. Six hours later – at 11am – those signatures would bring into effect the Armistice that ended World War I.

The 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month attained a special significance in the postwar years. The moment when hostilities ceased on the Western Front became universally associated with the remembrance of those who had died in the war.

Red poppies were among the first plants to spring up in the devastated battlefields of northern France and Belgium after the conflict ended. For this reason, the red poppy is worn on Remembrance Day in memory of those who served and made the ultimate sacrifice.

Everyone is asked to stop what they are doing at 11am on Remembrance Day and observe a moment's silence in memory of those who served and paid the supreme sacrifice in conflicts around the world..





Rural Market Reports

Weekly Wool Market

November 1st - What was hoped for was a dearer market. Unfortunately, the message was not received. The Aussie dollar falling considerably against the US was not a large enough signal on its own to drive the market into positive territory.

17.5 to 18.5 micron types registered the largest falls with selected Crossbred types and the Merino carding indicator showing some small gains. Whilst not all the gains that were made in early October have been given back, they certainly have been eroded, leaving the headline market indicators trading at levels just above the average for the

season to date.

Northern The region indicator lost 6 cents on Tuesday and a further 7 cents on Wednesday. The decline in the Eastern market indicator when looked at in US dollars was 19 cents (more than triple the decline in local dollars).

34,104 bales were sold nationally for the week with a passed in rate of 7.6%. Major buyers included PJ Morris, Techwool & Tianyu, all purchasing а significant proportion of the Merino fleece offering.

Upcoming weekly offerings are still tracking below the corresponding period last season with 118,000 fewer bales offered for the season to date.

Cricket


Guyra's under 11 cricket team has started the season with a win. In their opening game they bowled first after East Gold won the toss and elected to bat.



two or three teams on the field in 2025.




