"Events like these are vital for a town like Guyra as they give the entire community a chance to come together and celebrate the festive season.



History made at Guyra saleyards

History was made at the Guyra saleyards this week with the first sheep sold from the newly constructed facilities. Work is still be underway on a major upgrade of the Guyra yards, however an increased yarding has seen the pens put to the test for the first time.

The new yards feature a raised catwalk which enhances the experience for agents and buyers. It also allows sellers a better view of the interaction between buyers and agents.

Saleyards in both Guyra and Armidale are currently undergoing a multi-million dollar upgrade with funding of \$9.7 from Bushfire Local Economic Recovery Fund. The work is being co-funded by the Australian and NSW Governments.

Work at the Guyra Saleyards will include demolition, removal and waste disposal of timber sheep yards, staged construction of steel sheep yards, upgrading stock watering system in sequence with yard construction, road upgrade around the yards and relocating cattle yards. It is expected that construction will be completed in the new year.

Overall the lamb market for this time of year is historically very



high. Guyra graziers are benefitting from shortage of quality lambs in the south of the state due to dry conditions in Southern Riverina, Victoria and SA.

Lambs are currently making between 750c to 850c a kilo dressed weight.

The lead pen offered by Elders this week made \$255, being second cross lambs sold on behalf of Geoffrey Bell.

Farmers feed the world

National Agriculture Day, which was marked on Friday November 15th, is a great reminder for all Aussies to focus on who's really feeding their future.

NSW Farmers President Xavier Martin said Australia's \$82 billion agricultural industry was the foundation of the nation's food security, and would increasingly play a critical role in ensuring global food security into the future.

"In NSW alone, farmers can produce 100 million litres of milk, half a million tonnes of rice, 523,000 tonnes of grapes and 239,000 tonnes of oranges in a single year," Mr Martin said.

"Aussie agriculture keeps food on the table, clothes on our backs, people in jobs and whole families caring for the land and ensuring food security for generations to come.

"It's a sector with a really positive story – and it's a story we need

to start sharing far and wide, if we want to be able to feed the future."

There was no time like National Agriculture Day to reflect on how food gets on the nation's forks, Mr Martin said, with agriculture forming an essential part of everyday life around the planet.

"The fact is we all need a farmer three times a day for breakfast, lunch and dinner, so it's worth knowing what goes in to growing the healthy, fresh food you get to enjoy day in, day out," Mr Martin said.

"Our farmers are world leaders, with the sustainability and health credentials of our fresh food second to none, and our fibre is in demand across many different markets.

"Taking a moment to appreciate farmers and learn about agriculture and how it operates is important if we want to keep our farmers farming and secure food security for not just Australia, but also the world."

NSW Country Mayors' new leadership

The Country Mayors Association of NSW (CMA) held its Annual General Meeting at NSW Parliament House on Friday, with close to 150 in attendance. Mayor of Temora Shire Council, Cr. Rick Firman OAM was endorsed as Chairman of the CMA, unopposed, while Bega Valley Shire Mayor, Cr. Russell Fitzpatrick narrowly won the vote for Deputy Chairman over Armidale Regional Council Mayor, Cr. Sam Coupland.

Over 130 eligible voters selected seven candidates from a field of 13 for the Executive Board. Elected Mayors were Cr. Phyllis Miller OAM (Forbes Shire Council), Cr. Sam Coupland (Armidale Regional Council), Cr. John Medcalf OAM (Lachlan Shire Council), Cr. Sue Moore (Singleton Council), Cr.

Josh Black (Dubbo Regional Council), Cr. Russell Webb (Tamworth Regional Council) and Cr. Sharon Cadwallader (Ballina Shire Council). The team will serve for a two-year term.

Mayor Firman was delighted with the outcome of the AGM.

The new Chairman has been in local government since 2004, was elected Temora Shire Deputy Mayor in 2009, and being elevated as Mayor in 2012. Mayor Firman has served as Mayor since that time, as well as being the Chairman of the Riverina Eastern Regional Organisation of Councils (REROC) Board (serving since 2016), a Commissioner on the NSW Local Government Boundaries Commission (since 2016) and was appointed last year to the NSW Regional Health Ministerial Advisory Panel.

Investing back in the region

It is good to see there's money being put back into the region, particularly on our roads.

Rockvale Road at Aberfoyle is one area which will see \$4,249,093 invested to improve safety. The funding has been allocated to Armidale Regional Council and will see a road realignment and the installation of a roadside safety barrier.

The risk of crashes is far greater on country roads than urban roads with two-thirds of NSW road fatalities in regional and rural areas.

Last year 270 people were killed and 10,412 serious injuries on NSW roads. Many of these crashes can be prevented with infrastructure upgrades.

Roadside hazards, such as trees and wildlife, increases the risks associated with driving on these roads and the installation of safety barriers will help separate traffic from these roadside

hazards.

The funding is part of \$45 million handed out in Round 2 of the NSW Government's Towards Zero Safer Roads Program.

The Program is for local governments to increase road safety and work towards the targets of zero fatalities and serious injuries on NSW roads by 2025.

It was also excellent to see the Rotary Club of Guyra receive a \$145,079 grant to renovate the Old Scout Hall.

I met with the president of the Rotary Club of Guyra, Hans Hietbrink, who outlined the plan to improve the current condition of the hall to a state in which it can be used by community groups.

It is important the local community has facilities like the Old Guyra Scout Hall for groups to use.

But for them to use it, the hall needs repairs to its electrical and plumbing as well as a disability access ramp installed and painting re-done.

The funding comes from the NSW Government's Crown Reserve Improvement Fund and will ensure the Rotary Club of Guyra can well and truly get these improvements underway.

Well done to Rotary for taking the time to apply for the grant and putting plans in place to revive this community facility.



Many said it was the best place to grow up, we were never bored, there was always something to do like sport, fishing, swimming in creeks or the pool, camping at Copeton, riding bikes or visits to friends.

The overall outcome was the night was far too short and we need to catch up more frequently as it was just like it was yesterday as the memories flowed and filled the room.

We would like to thank the staff at Guyra Central School and the Guyra Library for helping us to gather some of the information for our booklet.

Organisers anticipate over 700 visitors to descend on the Guyra Showground, setting up camp for two to four nights. There has been an extremely positive response to the first full program in seven years.

The Guyra community has been hosting campdrafts at the picturesque Guyra Showgrounds for over 50 years. Like most rural communities, the Guyra Campdraft is rooted in tradition, steeped in skill and embraced by this typical Australian outback community.
