The Well Grown Community Grants program provides funding support for not-for-profit community organisations, sporting associations and schools.

In 2025 Costa will be awarding five grants up to a total of \$4000 each, with one grant to be awarded in each of the following category areas:

- Sporting event/activity which promotes and supports healthy active lifestyles.
- Community event which is aimed at supporting cultural diversity and/or creating

strong community connections.

- School project/initiative which enhances education or educational opportunities, particularly in the areas of healthy eating; or nutrition; or sustainability.
- Environmental initiative/activity which promotes the enhancement of our environment
- Community organisation project aimed at supporting disadvantaged youth and/or Indigenous youth projects.

Brett Ryan, State Manager Vertical Farming, said Costa was looking forward to continuing support for local community organisations.

"Over the past two years

since we started our grants program we have provided funding for a wide range of organisations including school kitchen garden program, local events and sporting clubs, which all in turn provide wonderful support and services for our community," Mr Ryan said.

Organisations seeking to apply for funding will need to complete our Expression of Interest form and submit it online by 5pm Friday, February 7.



President Trump had only one vote in the US election, it was the other 77,284,117 that changed the US and the direction of the world. It is those votes that is the reason that there are the executive powers to get out of 2050 net zero. Likewise on immigration, gender politics and the 180 degree turnaround on fossil fuel usage.

The people of the United States made their cost of living plan quite clear and the person they have directed to deliver on the cost of living plan is Donald Trump. How the rest of the world manages their other cost of living plans is up to them, and to be frank, not of a great concern to the United States.

President Trump said he would make massive changes and the moment he found a pen on his desk at the Oval Office he did precisely that. It may annoy many but he is

This is further exemplified by the crucial relationships we additionally have with Japan, India, Indonesia and our near islands neighbours.

In Australian politics there will be, I believe, some recent recollections of what happened in the US

at our coming election. There is an appeal apparent for politics that focuses on core domestic needs of Australians rather than the politics on issues of a global or peripheral

If the Teals believe that they will win votes locally in a cost of living crisis by being the champions of global issues, then my radar says that they won't be smashed but they will be surprisingly disappointed in how the mood has changed. My father had a saying that remains with me, "as poverty walks in the door love flies out the window". You can have all sorts of wonderful feelings about marvellous things, but if you can't pay for power, food and your rent those marvellous feelings will be little solace in your destitution.

Guyra Sheep & Lamb Sale

January 21st - Yarding of approximately 2000 made up of 500 sheep and 1500 lambs.

It was a reduced yarding compared to last week, with still a full field of buyers.

Across the board prices were cheaper compared to the previous week. Medium to heavy lambs made anywhere from \$150 to \$200. One pen lambs on averaged19kg with the best of those making \$270

Not enough restockers to quote, but there was a run of new season dorper lambs on offer that ranged from \$80 to \$110

There was a limited supply of mutton and best of those made \$130.

Medium weight merino sheep made anywhere from \$15 up to \$80 and lighter weight sheep made anywhere from \$10 to \$20

Rams made up to \$300 depending on skin

Sales are being held weekly until further notice.

Curtis Park Playground expansion to commence

Work to expand and upgrade Curtis Park Playground in Armidale will commence next month.

Permanent fencing is being installed around the perimeter of the park, enclosing the area which will be under construction.

"The existing adventure playground in Curtis Park opened in 2020, quickly becoming a much-loved place for families," Armidale Regional Councill Mayor Sam Coupland said.

"Playground and other park users responded enthusiastically when council presented the possibility of growing the facility and sought ideas." Community feedback suggested that the area should be fully fenced to create a large safe area, and that adding more and alternative play equipment would ensure all age ranges and abilities could enjoy the space.

At its Ordinary Council Meeting on 23 October 2024, the Council accepted amendments to concept plans for Curtis Park Playground Expansion and Upgrade based on community feedback received during public exhibition in August.

The endorsed plan will enclose an area of 1.6 acres, extending from the northern end of the car park at the Visitor

Information Centre across to Faulkner Street, joining into the existing playground fences.

"I'm excited that work is set to commence," said Mayor Coupland.

"The expanded facility will provide a fenced safe zone, feature natural play elements that supplement existing play experiences, and will link to the creeklands and surrounds including with footpath connections and through elements that tell the story of the place."

Access to the existing playground will be maintained throughout the works, however care is to be taken as there will be some work within the existing playground which will be fenced off temporarily.

The expanded playground, informed by the community and designed by Myrtle Studio Design is expected to be complete by 30 June 2025, weather permitting.

Tenders for the construction are currently being reviewed, and the contractor will be announced soon.

Kyle's fifth wicket partnership with Les Perrett proved the difference with some great game management shown by both.

Guyra edged ahead in the 18th over to finish with 4/85 and the win.
