## Free skin checks well supported

The Australian Skin Cancer Foundation skin check bus provided free skin checks at this year's Guyra Show. This service is provided to communities who otherwise may not be able to access a similar service, while further educating them on skin cancer and to take preventative measures.

The truck was very well supported with 232 people being seen over the two days. There were 41 lesions identified made up of squamous cell carcinomas, basal cell carcinomas and four melanomas.

It would not have been possible to bring this service to Guyra without the support of sponsors.

Can Assist Guyra Branch contributed \$5000 which was half of the cost. They were pleased to be able to give back to the Guyra community who support their fundraising activities very gener-



ously. They plan to support the Skin Check Truck again next year.

If just one life is saved through having this service come to Guyra it was well worthwhile. Prevention and/or treating patients early is very important for cure and stabilising their condition.

The balance of sponsorship came from the NSW Farmers Association Guyra Branch, Lions Club of Guyra, Guyra Rotary Club, Guyra Bowling and Recreation Club, St Mary of the Angels Parish Ladies, ÇWA Day Branch, CWA Evening Branch, and Guyra Show Society.

As well as declaring the event open, Kay was called on to present long term volunteer Dorothy Every OAM with life membership of the Guyra Show Society.

Dorothy's involvement with the Show dates back 42 years when she first started in the needlework section. She served as head steward of the needlework section for many years, and also headed the handiwork section for the Glen Innes Show Society.

Dorothy has acted as a strong role model of commitment to voluntary community awareness, involvement and community spirit. She facilitated the entry of student craft and actively motivated participation with donated sponsorships over many years.

The official opening was also a chance to recognise Guyra's entrant in the Royal Ag Shows Young Women competition.

Introduced by last year's winner Alice Stanley. 2025 Guyra Young Women Colleen Pearson is deeply involved in rural life and from a very young age has been involved in embracing the traditions of the Guyra Show and has always given it her all.

High quality poultry were on show, with 75 entries registered across all classes and we had our largest number of children entering. This was extremely exciting for everyone involved, as over the past three years, Guyra Poultry exhibitions have grown from 12 entries, to 55 entries to 75 entries. We need to build more cages!

# Grants open for community groups and organisations

Community groups and organisations are invited to apply for the next round of Armidale Regional Council community grants.

These grants aim to provide financial support for community projects and initiatives that require modest funding to meet local needs and boost community engagement. These may include funding for building communities and recreational opportunities, celebrating culture and creativity, ensuring environmental sustainability or supporting economy and business.

Local not-for-profit organisations and groups that support and provide services to the Armidale regional community are eligible to apply for:

- Community Small Grants up o \$2000
- Community Support Grants \$2000 to \$5000

Applicants must:

• Demonstrate that the proposed project will bring tangible benefits to residents of the Armidale Regional Council local government area.

- Adhere to the required Work Health and Safety policies and practices as mandated by legislation.
- Maintain appropriate and upto-date insurance coverage.
- Hold any necessary certificates when required, such as Police Checks, Working with Children Checks, or Working at Heights certification.
- Have successfully fulfilled all previous grant conditions and have no outstanding debts to the Council.
  - · Complete and submit an on-

line Grant Application by the specified due date.

The opportunity to apply for this grant round opens on Monday 17 February, and applications close Friday 14 March 2025.

# Parliamentary committee to consider splitting Hunter New England Health

Member for Northern Tablelands Brendan Moylan has encouraged the public to have their say on the introduction of the Health Services Amendment (Splitting of the Hunter New England Health District) Bill 2025.

The proposed Bill aims to dissolve the current Hunter New England Local Health District to establish two new districts -

Hunter Local Health District and the New England Northwest Local Health District.

The Bill has been referred to the Legislative Assembly Committee on Community Services which means the wider Hunter and New England communities will be able to have their say on the proposed changes.

Mr Moylan believes the referral

to a NSW Parliamentary Committee is important as it is the public who are affected by the current healthcare situation in the region.

"Splitting the health district has overwhelming public support," he said.

"I want to advocate better healthcare outcomes because the New England and Northwest regions are the ones who are crying out for better healthcare services.

"Having the Bill referred to a committee will see the public have the option of having input into the future of healthcare within the Hunter and New England regions.

"I will let the communities know when further details are released, and submissions are open."

### 41st Armidale Eisteddfod entries open

The Armidale Eisteddfod continues to be one of the feature events on Armidale's cultural calendar. Entries are now open and the Eisteddfod hosts a variety of sections and events for a wide range of ages and abilities. The Armidale Eisteddfod offers its audiences plenty of variety. Entries close on Friday 21 March.

The competition program runs from Wednesday 14 May to the 6 June. Choir Night, Band Night and the New England Championships are popular highlights. The Gala Concert this year is scheduled for Sunday 15 June at 2pm in the historic auditorium of the Old Teacher's College.

### Rural Market Reports

#### **Armidale Cattle Sale**

February 13th - Yarding 900 (-640) There was a sharp drop in supply on the back of some very useful storm rain over the past fortnight. It was a very mixed quality penning where condition also varied greatly.

There was more processor competition this week however the ranks are still not at capacity. Restocker and feedlot competition was also down.

Lightweight young cattle to restockers saw the steers sell to a dearer trend with some breed and quality related price change. The heifer portion mostly firm with quality also affecting price change.

The medium and heavy weights sold on a firm to cheaper trend with the good quality lots least affected.

A very mixed quality penning of grown cattle to suit processors. The well finished heavy grown steers sold to a dearer trend under the extra competition. Well finished grown heifers also sold to dearer trends however the plainer quality lots were cheaper.

Demand was high in the cow market with processors competing strongly. All classes showing strong gains. Heavy bulls sold on a firm to cheaper trend with quality variations accounting for positive price change.

#### **Weekly Wool Market**

February 21st - The first day of sales this week opened unchanged on the early market report but gave up further ground as the day progressed, with the Northern region indicator falling 13 cents. The final day of sales clawed back some of the losses leaving the indicator down a handful of cents for the week.

The Aussie dollar was three quarters of a cent stronger against the US dollar resulting in a 4 cent lift in the market when viewed in US dollars. After some solid gains over the past three weeks the Crossbred sector suffered some of the largest falls whilst the Merino

types produced mixed results.

36,035 bales were sold nationally for the week with the passed in rate of 8.2% falling closer to the season average.

Major buyers included Tianyu, Techwool and Endeavour Wool with an even spread in the buying pattern remaining a common theme. 170,000 fewer bales have been offered nationally for the season to date which is broadly in line with what todays 13.5% decline in AWTA testing data is showing. The quality of the offering is also showing a seasonal condition decline with a fall in better style, lower VM and higher strength types available to the trade.

#### **Vets Golf**

Last Tuesday the 18th, Guyra club was host for the 3rd round of the district pennants and what a great day it was.

Around 90 players took part and the praise we received for the condition of our course was amazing. Thank you green keepers, you are doing a brilliant job. As usual the support from the team in the bowling club was second to none. Thank you.

Guyra won the day to forge two points ahead of Armidale with two rounds to go. Some brilliant individual results with Deb Heffernan leading the way with 43 points to win the ladies A grade. Simone Sweeney was runner up with 38 points. Ladies B grade winner with 33 points was Shona Mulligan on a count back to Belinda Lenehan.

For the Men Scott Mendes was the winner with 37 points to runner up Custard Mulligan on 35. In B grade Chris Newberry was the winner with 38 points to runner up Neil Paine on 36. C grade winner with 37 points went to Len Stanley from runner up Graham Price on a count back from Phil Devlin both on 35. NTPs went to Graham Barr on the 7th, Si-

mone Sweeney on the 9th, Cheryl McDonald on the 10th and M Welbourne on the 18th.


