New frost-free record for May

May 2025 delivered an unusual twist in Guyra's climate history, with the town recording zero frosts for the month—a new record in 47 years of frost observations.

Traditionally, the frost season begins in late April or early May, but this year, not a single frost was reported by the end of May. The previous record low for May frost occurrences was one frost, recorded in both 1983 and 1991. This year's complete absence marks a significant deviation from the norm, with up to 10 frosts unusually recorded in May.

The lack of frosts is attributed to an unusually high number of lowpressure troughs affecting northern New South Wales throughout the year. These weather systems brought increased cloud cover, particularly overnight, which prevented the typical radiation cooling that leads to frost formation.

In addition to the absence of frost, overnight minimum temperatures were notably warmer. The average minimum for May was 6.9°C, the highest on record for the month. The previous record was 6.7°C, set in May 1989. The long-term average minimum for May is just 3.8°C, based on 92 years of data.

Long weekend brings first snowfall



The long weekend brought the first real taste of winter to the Guyra district for 2025.

Monday June 9th saw the arrival of cold, windy and showery conditions across the Northern Tablelands with light snowfalls in the higher areas including Black Mountain, Guyra and Ben Lomond.

In Guyra there were light snow showers throughout the day but mostly the snow did not settle on the ground. The snowy conditions were the result of very cold south-westerly winds following a front and low pressure trough combined with upper level cold air. After a minimum temperature of 0.7C, the maximum for the day was only 4.9C, although the strong westerly winds made it feel much colder. This temperature was the lowest June maximum for four years.

Information sessions for proposed Boorolong Wind Farm

Information sessions are being held to by Squadron Energy to preview the updated layout of the proposed Boorolong Wind Farm. Community members are being invited to learn more about the overall project, and share their feedback.

The proposed wind farm, located around 15km north-west of Armidale, within the New England Renewable Energy Zone (REZ), is going through its next stage of community consultation and planning.

It was first introduced to the local community in 2022 and has since adjusted the project layout to reduce impacts. Currently, the proposed project consists of 71 wind turbines as well as battery storage. With an expected capacity of 426MW, it is expected to power 230,000 homes while avoiding 200,000 tonnes of emissions annually.

Squadron Energy's General Manager Development, Alastair Smith said the project team had made some changes to the original project proposal after taking on community feedback and were now ready to hear from the community again about the updated proposal.

"We want to ensure we are engaging with the community every step of the way as this project progresses," Mr Smith said. "We are hosting a community drop-in session and would encourage interested community members to attend, to understand more about the proposed project and to provide feedback.

"This project will be investing in community benefits for the region, which will strengthen the local economy, create jobs, support essential community programs, and leave a legacy into the future."

The community drop-in session is being held on Thursday 12 June from 2pm to 7pm in the Auditorium at the Armidale Ex Service Memorial Club - 137 Dumaresq St, Armidale.



Protecting our energy tradition means updating it

Australia has long supplied energy and manufactured products to the world.

We can protect this tradition by updating. Local companies have already moved into cleaner production and we already supply more than 40% of our National Electricity Market with clean energy.

At independent industry think tank Beyond Zero Emissions, we created an assessment to measure progress to clean exports in our industrial regions.

Our recent assessment of the Hunter shows local industry wants to move to clean production, but delivering that clean energy to industry is lagging on 17 of 19 indicators.

Local industry needs the Hunter Transmission Project completed in 2028 to deliver that clean energy and some 74% of the renewable energy capacity pipeline is yet to receive planning approval which typically takes between five and eight years. Australia's only remaining steel bar processor, Milltech Martin Bright, saved nearly \$5 million from 2014 to 2024 whilst saving 44,000 tonnes of emissions through a large solar installation, upgrading air compressors and the purchase of a power analyser, among other things.

Our regions can be clean manufacturing powerhouses. But we need to coordinate and prepare regionally and nationally, now.

Armidale Regional Council supports flood recovery

Armidale Regional Council, in partnership with Kellys Transport and the Duval Lions Club, is lending a helping hand to flood-affected communities in the Taree region by donating and delivering hay bales to support local farmers and their livestock.

The hay, sourced from Council's Wastewater reuse farm, was transported by Kellys Transport, with the Duval Lions Club coordinating logistics to ensure the delivery reaches farms most in need. These areas have been severely impacted by recent flooding, leaving many communities isolated from essential resources such as feed for their animals.

Armidale Regional Council Mayor Sam Coupland said the initiative reflects the region's strong sense of community and shared responsibility.

"Our region understands all too well the devastating impact of extreme weather events. We've experienced firsthand the challenges of recovery, and we know how important it is to have support from

Annual four-month trout fishing closure from June 10

The June long weekend offered anglers their final opportunity for trout fishing in streams and rivers across NSW before the fishing season closes over winter.

NSW Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development (DPI) Program Leader Fish Stocking and Enhancement, Jim Harnwell said the annual closure, commencing on Tuesday June 10th, is crucial to allow salmonid species to breed uninterrupted during their annual spawning season.

"The four-month closure ensures we protect our valuable fisheries resources for future seasons," Mr Harnwell said.

"By giving salmonid species the opportunity to spawn without disturbance, we help maintain healthy fish populations for recreational fishers to enjoy in the years ahead."

While the closure restricts fishing in trout streams and rivers, anglers can still enjoy fishing at popular trout dams and designated waterways across NSW, including Malpas dam.

The fishing season for trout and salmon in trout rivers and streams will re-open from the start of the October long weekend, Saturday, 4 October 2025.

Fshing in trout streams during the closed streams is an offence. DPIRD Fisheries Officers will be actively patrolling inland waterways throughout the closure to ensure compliance,.

Fishers heading to any of the trout dams this winter are reminded that they are required to always have a current NSW recreational fishing fee receipt (fishing licence) on them while fishing.

Members of the public are encouraged to report any suspected illegal fishing activity or to the Fishers Watch phone line on 1800 043 536.







June 5th - Armidale penned 2090 good quality cattle, 1160 up on the previous sal with Winter setting in. All categories were on offer. The regular buyers attended although an exporter and a feeder buyer did not operate. Trends varied with steer competition waning heifers and cows to a positive demand. Weaner steers to background 414c to 480c/kg the heifers to 314c/kg. Light steers to background marginally cheaper 330c to 440c/kg. Medium steers to feed slipped 23c/kg 334c to 450c/kg. Weekly Wool Market

June 6th - With the Western region not selling it was the smallest national offering since the Eastern market indicator plummeted to 858 cents in September 2020 during the Covid period. Tuesday's sale showed some encouraging signs with the Northern region indicator climbing 2 cents. Wednesday set a different tone and a 12 cent loss was recorded. Crossbreds were a bright spot in the market with the 28 micron indicator now 20% dearer than the corresponding period last season. In US dollar terms the Eastern market indicator lost 1 cent making it the sixth week in a row of a baunchanged sically market. 20,539 bales were sold nationally with a passed in rate of 9.9%. Major buyers included Techwool, Tianyu and Fox & Lillie. AWTA test data for May recorded a large 23% reduction in the number of bales tested nationally. Weekly auction offering's look set to remain between 20-30,000 bales for the foreseeable future, right up to the midrecess period that year commences the week of the 28th of July.

BigRus achieved the highest score of our Locals and his 14 points brings him into 3rd place.


Winter Wombat remains in top spot on the Leaderboard, now on 139 points.
