First Ever Dolly's Dream and VRA round for Junior Spuds

Emergency work on New England Highway

Transport for NSW is working with Armidale Regional Council to carry out urgent repairs on the New England Highway. Due to widespread recent wet weather impacts on the road network, Transport resources were deployed to areas of most need across the state. Armidale Regional Council is assisting Transport during this time to address the pavement defects current on the New England Highway starting from Puddledock Road, north of Armidale. The

pavement defect work includes pothole repair and heavy patching where required. The unplanned diversion due to flooding on the Pacific Highway of high numbers of heavy vehicles, including B-doubles, onto the New England Highway has had serious impacts on the road and the continued wet weather has made it extremely difficult to repair the pavement. 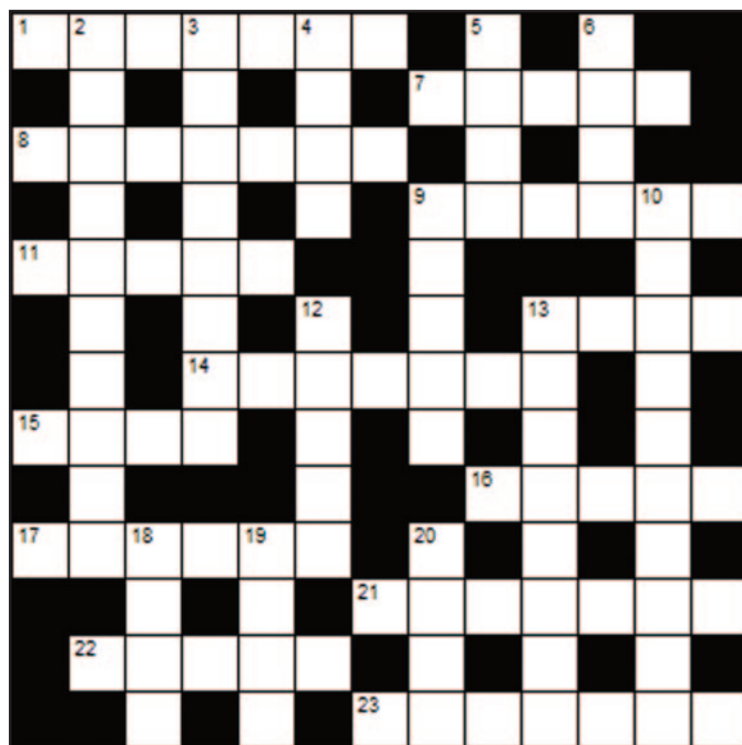

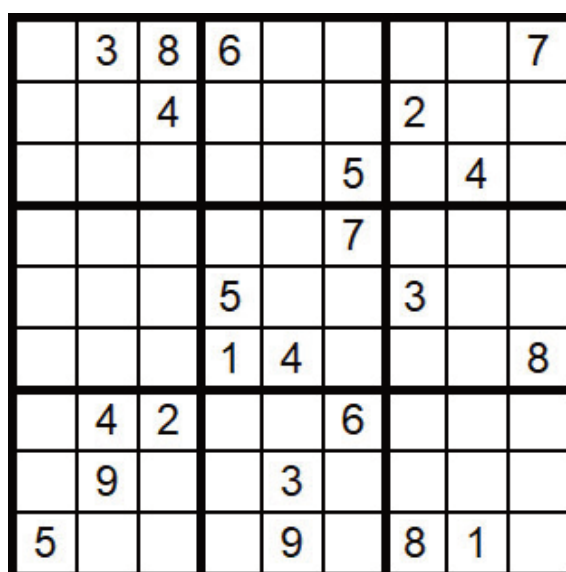

against students across the Armidale Zone. Although results varied by age group, three students secured their places on the Armidale Zone team for the North West trial in Coolah. Congratulations to Ashton Hutton, Ariella Galindo, and Charles Gordon for qualifying for the North West Cross Country Trial.

Guyra Central School sent a team of primary and secondary students to the North West Cross Country Trial in Coolah on Thursday June 12th.

The North West Zone consists of around 95 primary schools and 36 high schools in our area. Competing at this level against 10 zones

that together form the North West Zone is a remarkable accomplishment.

Our students gave their best and should be proud of their efforts in Cross Country this year. Guyra Central School boasts three students who have qualified to participate in the NSW CHSSA Cross Country in Sydney early next term. Congratulations to Jess Fletcher (5th in the 12-Year Girls), Rose Gordon (6th in the 13-Year Girls), Jake Beard (4th in the Open Boys), and Sherkaya Munro-Davies, who is a reserve runner (7th in the 12-Year Girls).

Rural Market Reports

Armidale Cattle Sale

June 19th - Armidale penned similar numbers to last sale at 2010 mixed cattle with plenty of plainer types offered courtesy of Winter conditions.

Limited cow buyers saw that category sell to cheaper trends for the most part. Steer yearlings sold to mostly dearer trends heifer drafts cheaper.

Light background steers gained 11c/kg 296c to 438c/kg. Medium steers to background slipped 47c/kg and sold to 380c/kg. The feeder drafts gained 8c/kg 320c to 448c/kg. Heavy feeders were significantly

cheaper making 374c to 452c/kg.

Heifers in the 200 to 280kgs range to background slipped 2c/kg 262c to 335c/kg. Medium feeders were back 26c/kg 308c to 350c/kg. Heavy feeders gained 14c/kg 322c to 360c/kg. Heavy processor heifers 315c to 330c/kg.

Grown steers to feed lost 12c/kg and similar heifers back 26c/kg. Medium cows to the paddock down 22c/kg selling to 263c/kg. Heavy cows generally cheaper with the exception of heavy four scores which were slightly dearer 283c to 307c/kg. A run of PTIC cows made 248c

to 346c/kg back to the paddock. Bulls were cheaper 206c to 325c/kg. **Stephen Adams MLA**

Weekly Wool Market

June 20th - With only the Eastern seaboard selling this week the smallest national offering of the season was presented to the trade. Gains were made over both selling days in the Northern region for almost all types. Small gains were also recorded by the market when looked at in US dollars, but it remains locked into a holding pattern, operating within just a 10 cent trading band over the past 9 weeks.

19,637 bales were sold nationally with a passed in rate of 5.4%. Major buyers included Sequoia, Techwool and PJ Morris. Next week's national offering increases by almost 12,000 bales driven by the Western region returning and the last sale for the financial year. After what was considered a successful trial of selling for the first four weeks of the new season before heading into the three week recess has been implement again for the start of the 2025/26 season. Recess commences the week of the 28th of July. Next season's sale roster is attached.

Some puddles have tadpoles in them.

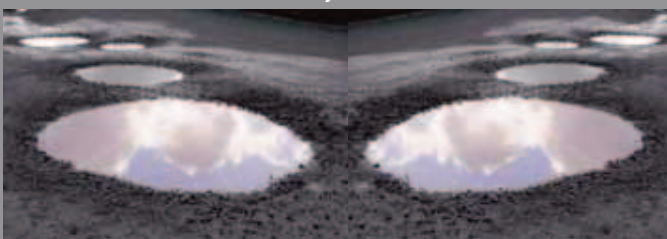
