The tour is an annual celebration of the Lotus brand, car culture, and community spirit. Its members are a diverse group of car enthusiasts united by a passion for Lotus vehicles who share a collective interest in maintaining and celebrating the history of Lotus cars

"The CWA's meeting rooms, conveniently located opposite the Car Museum, will host us for a warm and welcoming gathering.

"The museum, a key stop on the tour, offers a glimpse into the rich history of motoring and car culture in the region."

"We invite all Lotus enthusiasts and car fans to join us in celebrating this incredible brand and to support the fantastic local communities along the Grand Tour route."

The first car is expected to arrive in Guyra at around 10:30 AM, with Ken Philp in his iconic black 2007 Lotus Europa leading the convoy. The cars participating in this year's GT span from the 1960s to 2025 models, showcasing the evolution of Lotus design and engineering over more than half a century.



Curtis Park Playground upgrade complete

Armidale Regional Council has celebrated the opening of the expanded and upgraded Curtis Park Playground in Armidale.

The playground expansion and upgrade was designed and delivered based on extensive community feedback, and thanks to funding from the Australian Government via a Local Roads Community Infrastructure grant and a financial contribution from Council.

The original Adventure Playground at Curtis Park opened in 2020 and has been widely used by families throughout the community. However, since it opened Council received feedback that the area should be fully fenced and that there is not enough play equipment to suit all age ranges and abilities.

The new fenced safe zone encloses an area of 1.6 acres, joining into the previously existing playground fences. The expanded playground includes natural play elements that tell the story of the

place and spark imagination, supplementing already existing play experiences. The new play equipment includes a WE GO accessibility swing, 4.5m mammoth net swing, natural rock yarning circle, natural rock wall with varying levels, and a 'mouse wheel'.

Scammers Strike During Tax Time: ATO Warns **Australians to Stay Vigilant**

As the new financial year arrives, Australians are being urged to be on high alert for scammers hoping to cash in on tax-time confusion. Authorities warn this time of year is like Christmas for fraudsters, with a sharp rise in fake messages, phone calls, and emails claiming to be from government agencies like the ATO, Centrelink, or major banks.

The Australian Taxation Office has made it clear: it will never send a text or email asking you to "click this link now" to avoid penalties, access a refund, or prevent your account from being shut down.

Likewise, no legitimate government department will threaten you with arrest, demand immediate payment, or offer fast-tracked refunds in exchange for gift cards or small deposits.

Australians are also reminded that the ATO, Centrelink, and other government bodies will never ask for your bank details over the phone or through unsolicited messages.

If there is something important to communicate, these departments will simply notify you that you "have a letter in your inbox" and ask you to log in securely via your official myGov account.

Authorities are also urging the public to check in with friends and family members-particularly the elderly or those who may be less tech-savvy-who are at higher risk of falling victim to scams. A quick conversation could help prevent someone you care about from being tricked out of their personal information or hard-earned money.

If you receive a suspicious message or call, report it to Scamwatch and delete it immediately. Don't get caught outwhen in doubt, don't click.



Call for Nominations: Japan-Australia Grassroots **Exchange Program 2026**

RSL Australia is inviting nominations for the 2026 Japan-Australia Grassroots Exchange Program, a unique opportunity for descendants of Australian Prisoners of War (POWs) to visit Japan and participate in a meaningful cultural exchange.

Now in its third decade, the program-originally launched in 1994 as the Hand of Friendship projectaims to promote reconciliation and deepen mutual understanding between Japan and Australia. Two selected participants will travel to Japan for eight days in February or March 2026, with the Japanese Government covering most travel and accommodation expenses.

The itinerary includes official

meetings with Japanese government representatives, a visit to the Commonwealth War Cemetery, cultural tours, and a formal dinner hosted by Japan's Ministry of Foreign Affairs.

Eligible applicants must be direct descendants of Australian POWs. To apply, individuals must email support@rslnsw.org.au by 5:00pm AEST on Friday 25 July 2025, including a completed nomination form, a passport-sized photo, and supporting documentation detailing their POW connection, personal background, and interest in the program.

Rural Market Reports

Weekly Wool Market

June 27th - It was mostly a positive start to sales this week and whilst the Northern region indicator closed 4 cents dearer on Tuesday there was some obvious weaker areas in the market. This carried over to Wednesday with a 6 cent loss recorded on the final selling day for the 2024/25 season. The Crossbred sector continues to outperform with the 28 micron indicator (coming off a low base) gaining over 25% for the season. 27,649 bales were sold nationally for the week with a passed in rate of 7.4%. Sequoia, Techwool & Tianyu were the major buyers. The Eastern market indicator's average weekly closing level for the season was 1167 cents just 12 cents higher than the previous season. 256,000 fewer bales were offered in the 2024/25 season. To put that into context based on average weekly national offerings the last few seasons that reduction is the equivalent of seven selling weeks' worth of wool. On a positive note, the market starts the new season 5% higher than the previous two seasons and managed to stabilise in June rather than lose ground. Supply will remain tight and it won't take much of an increase in demand to make things interesting.


Also scoring 14 points in the Locals were Winter Wombat and DJFlake69.
