\$7,900 Raised for Chopper in its 25th year

Local support was on full display at the Guvra sheep and lamb sale on August 26th, where \$7,900 was raised for the Westpac Rescue Helicopter Service (WRHS) through generous donations of lambs ahead of the annual Ride for the Chopper.

The fundraiser called on local producers to donate lambs for auction, with proceeds going directly to support the lifesaving aeromedical service. Local producers responded in force to the call out, showing continued support for this great cause.

A standout moment saw one lamb fetch \$500 before being redonated and sold three times.

WRHS spokesperson Kim Newling thanked local producers, agents and buyers for their ongoing generosity.

"Yesterday we celebrated 25 years of the service in the region, and these funds go straight to supporting our Tamworth base to keep us flying 24/7," she said.

Local organiser Wayne Jenkyn praised the quality of stock donated.

"The support from local producers was fantastic - they didn't hold back and sent in some of their best lambs. Buyers also stepped up, paying well above the going rate."

This year's sale held special significance, coinciding with a major milestone for WRHS: the 25th an-

niversary of continuous operations from its Tamworth Base.

Since its launch in August 2000, the Tamworth Base has grown into a vital emergency response hub for communities across the New England North West. Starting with a single-engine Bell 407 helicopter operating from a shared hangar, the service has evolved significantly, deploying state-of-the-art AW139 helicopters as part of a statewide aeromedical network.

WRHS CEO Steven Underwood acknowledged the milestone, calling it a testament to the strength and generosity of the local community.

"Throughout droughts, bushfires, floods and tough economic times, the people of this region have been unwavering in their support of the Service and for that we are humbled and deeply grateful,"

With the Ride for the Chopper event set to take place this September, Team Guyra's lamb sale is just one of many community efforts to raise funds for the WRHS.

Strong results at working dog auction

All 20 dogs offered at the 2025 Top of the Range Working Dog Auction were successfully sold, marking another standout year for the event.

The top price of the day went to Lot 4, Yellowstone Demi, who fetched an impressive \$12,400. The vendor, Dylan Sutton, sold the dog to a buyer from Finley, NSW. The second-highest price was achieved by Lot 20, Baz, offered by the Dandylea Partnership, who sold for \$8,800 and will remain in the local area.

The auction recorded an average sale price of \$5,170, reflecting strong demand and ongoing confidence in quality working dogs. A total of 10 dogs were sold online via AuctionsPlus, with 600 online bids placed throughout the event. The catalogue drew widespread attention, receiving over 10,000 views, and there were 18 registered bidders onsite.

Dogs sold are now heading to new homes across New South Wales and into Southern Queensland, highlighting the auction's broad reach. Special thanks were given to Southern Dog Transport for ensuring the smooth and safe delivery of the dogs to their new owners.

Disaster Assistance extended following August snowstorm

Disaster assistance has been extended to the Armidale region following the severe snowstorm that swept across the Northern Tablelands on 2 August, causing significant damage to infrastructure, homes, and services.

The Albanese and Minns Governments have included Armidale Regional Council in the latest expansion of the NSW Government's Natural Disaster Declaration, alongside Dungog, Port Stephens, Singleton, and Upper Hunter. These additions join the already declared areas of Gunnedah, Narrabri, Tamworth, Uralla, and Walcha.

Support is being delivered under the jointly funded Commonwealth-State Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements (DRFA), offering a range of financial assistance to residents, councils, small businesses, and primary producers affected by the storm.

Member for Northern Tablelands Brendan Moylan welcomed the announcement, saying the inclusion of Armidale would ease the financial burden on both residents and the council.

"Armidale has now been declared eligible for disaster assistance, which will greatly assist council with the cost of the clean-up," Mr Moylan said.

"The declaration also means low-income, uninsured residents can access support to replace essential household items and undertake vital structural repairs to make their homes safe again."

Support available under the DRFA includes:

• Emergency assistance for

temporary accommodation and essential needs.

- Grants for uninsured, lowincome residents to replace household items or repair homes
- Financial assistance for local councils to restore damaged public infrastructure.
- Concessional loans of up to \$130,000 for small businesses, primary producers, and not-for-profits.
- Freight subsidies of up to \$15,000 for primary producers to transport livestock and fodder.

While Mr Moylan expressed concern that grants have not been extended to primary producers and local organisations, he acknowledged the assistance as a positive step.

"Although it is disappointing

the government has not taken the step of offering grants to primary producers, businesses and community groups, it is reassuring there is some sort of support available."

NSW Minister for Recovery Janelle Saffin said the government acted quickly to support communities impacted by the widespread damage.

"The Minns Government has worked closely with the Australian Government to activate support which will meet immediate community needs and support the significant clean-up efforts now underway," Ms Saffin said.

\$300,000 to rehabilitate Guyra Landfill

The former Guyra landfill will undergo a major rehabilitation thanks to a \$300,000 investment from the NSW Government, aimed at reducing environmental risks and modernising waste infrastructure in regional New South Wales.

The funding is part of the \$5.9 million Landfill Consolidation and Environmental Improvement Program, which will support 35 waste infrastructure projects across the state. The Guyra project, managed by Armidale Regional Council, is one of several regional sites se-

lected for closure, rehabilitation, or upgrades to reduce pollution and improve long-term sustainability.

Located near Urandangie Creek, which flows into Malpas Dam - a major water source for the region - the Guyra landfill operated from the 1960s to the early 1990s without a liner or modern containment systems. Although it has since been converted into a transfer station, legacy issues such as leachate, erosion, and exposed waste continue to pose environmental risks.

This new funding will allow the council to cap the old landfill, addressing infiltration and reducing leachate generation, odours, and greenhouse gas emissions. The upgrade will also stabilise eroded areas and reduce the risk of stormwater runoff contaminating nearby water sources.

Alexandra Geddes, Executive Director of Programs & Innovation at the NSW Environment Protection Authority (EPA), said the program targets long-standing issues at aging landfill sites.

In addition to closing high-

risk landfill sites, the program is supporting the construction and upgrade of 13 transfer stations, expanding local recycling capabilities and improving waste handling in rural and regional communities.

Uralla Shire Council has also received funding under the program. It will receive \$195,785 for transfer station and landfill upgrades at Uralla, Bundarra, and Kingstown. As part of the upgrade, the Bundarra site will stop operating as a landfill and be converted to a waste transfer station.



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

OPINION: Guyra's Glasshouse Future: Growing Upwards, Growing Smarters

From Costa's thriving glasshouses to Dyson's groundbreaking vertical systems, Guyra's cool climate and proven expertise may place the town at the forefront of a new era in farming -where crops rise upward, technology tends the harvest, and the Tablelands quietly shape the future of food.

Guyra has always been a place where land and people work together to grow something remarkable. From early farming on the Tablelands to Costa's vast glasshouses producing tomatoes and capsicums, the town has shown an ability to adapt, innovate, and thrive.

Rural Market Reports

Armidale Cattle Sale

August 14th -Armidale numbers increased slightly to 917 mixed cattle showing their Winter condition. It was very much a background and feeder offering with a shortage of domestic processing cattle. Cows were in good numbers.

Trends varied with heavy grown heifers selling to cheaper trends. The regular buyers attended not all operating.

Steers to 280kgs to background were dearer 300c to 566c/kg. Medium feeders much dearer 370c to 546c/kg. Feeders to 480kgs gained 36c/kg 393c to 480c/kg. Steers over 480kgs to

feed sold to 505c/kg.

Light heifers to background lifted as much as 42c/kg 320c to 440c/kg. Medium feeders 12c/kg better 412c to 436c/kg. Heavy feeders 436c to 442c/kg. Grown heifers over 540kgs 362c to 484c/kg. Similar feeders 428c to 434c/kg.

Medium cows dearer 280c to 375c/kg. Heavy cows slipped 17c to 33c/kg 320c to 388c/kg. Heavy bulls were cheaper 270c to 348c/kg.

Weekly Wool Sales

August 22nd - Sales resumed on Tuesday after the annual

three week recess with the market delivering a relatively strong overall performance. Prices were dearer upon opening and gained momentum as the day progressed with the Northern region indictor climbing 13 cents for the day.

The market consolidated and largely held onto the previous day's gains by Wednesdays close. When looked at in US dollars the Eastern market indicator lost 10 cents for the week. Importantly it remained above 800 cents, a level at which it only managed to trade above twice in the past two selling seasons.

41,303 bales were offered nationally for the week with

38,453 sold. Major buyers included Tianyu, PJ Morris and Techwool with good support from the rest of the trade. Next week's expected national offering reduces in size to just over 30,000 bales with a similar figure estimated for the follow week

In a further positive sign, several contracts traded on the forward market for the Spring period at levels equivalent to this week's auction close. AWTA test data for July was released during the recess showing a 9.5% reduction in the weight of wool tested nationally.
