World record attempt falls just short

Jeremy Newberry showed exactly what it means to give everything you've got when he attempted to break the merino wether shearing world record at Bundarra on October 11th.

Jeremy stepped up for his solo 8-hour record attempt with determination and quiet intensity, but the day didn't start in his favour. By lunchtime, he was six sheep behind record pace which was a difficult position to be in at the halfway mark.

Returning to the board for the third run with renewed fire, Jeremy launched into a mesmerising run with heart, strength, grit and flow that spectators said was a sight to behold. He shore a never before achieved 96 Merino wethers in a single run, giving himself a shot at achieving his

The final run became a shared emotional journey, with the cheering crowd on the edge of their seats. They were with Jeremy for every blow, holding their breath at every sheep wriggle and sending him into the pen for every catch with a roar of motivation. It was going to come down to the line.

When the tally was confirmed at 371, just two short of the world record held by Steven "Muddy" Mudford at 373, the crowd didn't respond with disappointment, instead they cheered and he had earned the respect and awe of everyone in the shed.

The event also carried a powerful message of care beyond the board. Jeremy and wife Mandy had arranged for record memorabilia to be auctioned, with all proceeds supporting sHedway, a cause dedicated to suicide prevention in the

shearing industry. In total, an impressive \$1650 was raised, helping ensure that mental health support continues to reach those in need across the sheds.

Jeremy had great support from both his team

and the crowd that filled the shed on the day. While he may have missed the official world record, he showed great strength with his performance and in the eyes of those present he was a champion.

Last chance to support Mango Fundraiser

Mango season is almost here and so is the annual Guyra Mango Fundraiser is back for its 11th year, offering trays of juicy Kensington Pride mangoes just in time for Christmas. What started in 2014 with just 88 trays has now grown into a local tradition, with previous years seeing between 300 and 600 trays sold. "I grew up with mango trees in my backyard and have a love for Kensington Pride mangoes," she said. "This fundraiser lets me share that joy with my family and community, while supporting a cause close to our hearts."

New England Renewable Energy Zone

The Energy Corporation of NSW (EnergyCo) is delivering the New England Renewable Energy Zone (REZ) to provide clean, affordable and reliable power supply for homes and businesses across NSW.

Corridor update

We are updating part of the corridor that will connect the REZ to the existing grid at Muswellbrook.

We have identified a new study area between the Bayswater Power Station and the central south energy hub (substation) near Walcha which will allow for safer and more efficient construction with fewer environmental and road impacts. The move will also ensure the transmission lines do not affect aerial firefighting operations around Chaffey Dam and Lake Glenbawn.

We are inviting local feedback as we refine the study area in the coming months and complete further assessments.

Mobile Service Centres visiting in November

Guyra residents will have the chance to access a range of government services locally with the Australian Government Mobile Service Centre and the NSW Government Mobile Service centre both planning visits in November.

The mobile service centre operated by Services Australia will be in Guyra on November 13th from 9am to 3pm. The vehicle will be parked in Rotary Park on the New England Highway.

Federal Member for New England Barnaby Joyce said staff onboard the mobile centre can assist with Centrelink and Medicare payments and services, as well as provide information on Department of Veterans' Affairs programs and support for veterans and their families.

The Mobile Service Centre offers disabled access and free Wi-Fi, making it easier for visitors to create myGov accounts and access online services.

Residents will also be able to access a range of NSW Government

services close to home on November 25th.

The Service NSW bus will be located at the Bradley Street car park from 9:00am to 12:00pm.

Locals can take advantage of a variety of services usually available at a Service NSW centre, including:

- Driver Knowledge Tests
- Driver licence, mobility parking, and photo card applications
- Working with Children Checks
- NDIS Worker Checks
- Birth, death, and marriage certificate applications
- Cost of living support information, and more.

This visit is an opportunity for community members to complete essential documentation and access support services without travelling out of town.

Residents are encouraged to check the latest timetable by calling 13 77 88 or by visiting the website service.nsw.gov.au, as severe weather may cause schedule changes at short notice.

From the Archives at the Guyra Museum

The Origin of Bradley Street

On March 20th 1885, Guyra was proclaimed a "Village". The original street names in 1886 were very American, e.g. First Avenue, Second Avenue, etc. up to Ninth Avenue. These streets which formed the original village, now known as South Guyra, were renamed some time after 1886, when all but one was named after local Parishes and Counties.

When Guyra North became settled, a lot of these streets were also given the names of local Parishes, whilst other streets derive their names from early settlers who contributed to the growth of Guyra.

Bradley Street would appear to have been named after the District Inspector of Schools Mr. John D. Bradley.

Mr Bradley was in charge of the Armidale inspectorate from 1872 to 1877, and from 1880 to 1904, when he left the district and was promoted to Deputy Chief Inspector.

His first visit to "Mother of Ducks", which is what Guyra was originally called before it became the village of Guyra, was in 1882, regarding the application from some of the residents to establish a school in the area.

Until he left in 1904, Bradley

became very familiar with the Guyra people as he always supervised the Guyra area himself. The original school (situated on the corner of Robinson Lane and Baldersleigh Road) was used for 10 years, and when a larger school was needed Bradley chose the site of the current Guyra Shire Council Chambers, and that school was used from 1893 to 1977.

This street in which the school was situated became the main street and, although for a time it was called Armidale Street, it became unofficially known as Bradley Street. (In the Guyra Argus of 6th January 1908 Bradley Street is

mentioned; on a 1911 map it is referred to as Armidale Street.) It stayed unofficially Bradley Street until it was officially changed in September 1921.

Or: According to some of our older population, Bradley Street was named after Rev. William Henderson Bradley. Rev. W.H. Bradley was ordained in 1897, and inducted into the pastoral charge of the Guyra — Wandsworth Presbyterian Parish on 27th March 1908.

After 4 years of serving the Guyra- Wandsworth Area Rev. Bradley resigned, and on the 3rd April 1912 was inducted into the Leura- Wentworth Falls Area.

Exceptional season for young soccer star

Eli McGinty first laced up his boots at age six with the Guyra United Soccer Club "Caspers". In 2023, at just 13, he transitioned to the Northern Inland Rangers, a regional Premier Youth League team based in Tamworth that competes in a Newcastle-based competition known for developing high-potential young players through elitelevel football.

Eli has recently capped off an exceptional season by receiving multiple honours at this year's end-of-season celebrations. He was voted Players' Player for the Under 16 Premier Youth League (PYL) team, and was also named the 2025 Club Champion, the club's highest accolade, awarded annually to one male and one female athlete who demonstrate outstanding performance, commitment and leadership.

Eli's achievements are particularly notable given the challenges he faced leading into the season. After sustaining a serious sports injury in 2024, which sidelined him for the final month of competition, he dedicated his off-season to an intensive rehabilitation program, returning stronger and more determined than ever.

A passionate goalkeeper, Eli has show-

cased his versatility and commitment contributing across three age groups. He served as the sole goalkeeper for the Under16s, stepped in as goalkeeper for the Under 18s when their keeper was injured, and played full-time on field for the Under 15s as both

a striker and central defender, while also filling in as goalkeeper when needed.

Beyond club commitments, Eli represents the Northern Inland Rangers Football Club (NIRFC) in the Northern NSW Football Talent Support Program (TSP), where he receives specialised goalkeeper training every fortnight and competes in state wide Gala Days. These high-level opportunities allow him to train and play alongside some of the strongest young players in NSW and be visible to selectors for academy squads and national development pathways such as the Socceroos.

The Northern Inland Rangers Football Club represents athletes aged 8 to 18 from across Northern Inland NSW, drawing from areas such as Glen Innes, Moree, Narrabri and Scone. The club is committed to developing disciplined, skilled and community-minded players who demonstrate both football excellence and strong character.
